Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

cation U Zaw Win, and officials visited No 5 Basic Education High School in Zabuthiri Township and No 18 Basic Education High School in Dekkhinathiri Township in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

During the visits, Union ministers and party observed enjoyable and peaceful study of teachers and students and provided the necessary assistance in the school-based COVID-19 vaccination of students from 5 to 12 years old, which was carried out with the cooperation between officials and health workers.

Similarly, Chairman Dr Maung Maung Naing of the Nay Pyi Taw Council also vis-

ited No 1 Basic Education High School in Pynmana Township, No (3) Basic Education High School in Pobbathiri Township, No 12 Basic Education High School in Ottarathiri Township and distributed masks to students and gave necessary instructions for the vaccination of the students.

In Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory, a total of 190,200 students are currently studying at 757 basic education schools, 28 monastic schools, and 57 private schools, which have been reopened. It is reported that 109,682 students between the age of 5 and 12 will be vaccinated against COVID-19. — MNA

15th Economic Research Institute for ASEAN and East Asia Governing Board Meeting held

DEPUTY Minister for Investment and Foreign Economic Relations and Economic Research Institute for ASEAN and East Asia (ERIA) Governor for Myanmar U Than Aung Kyaw joined the 15th ERIA Governing Board Meeting which was held via video-conferencing at the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations, Nay Pyi Taw.

The meeting was attended by ERIA governors who are deputy ministers, permanent secretaries, director-generals and professors from ASEAN Member States, Australia, China, India, Japan, Korea and New Zealand, and ERIA academic advisory council members, ASEAN Secretary-General and senior officials also joined the meeting. The meeting was chaired by Professor Dr Cielito F. Habito from Ateneo de Manila University of the Philippines.

At the opening session, Professor Dr Cielito F. Habito, Chairperson of the ERIA Governing Board, Professor Hidetoshi Nishimura, President of ERIA and Dato Paduka Lim Jock Hoi, Secretary-General of ASEAN gave the remarks.

After that, Chief Economist of ERIA, Prof Fukunari Kimura presented the impacts of recent global developments on the ASEAN and East Asia region, and Senior Policy Fellow of ERIA, Prof Jun Arima presented the East Asia energy policy research roadmap for 2022-2023. Then, ERIA governors exchanged views on the impacts of global developments on the ASEAN and East Asia region and gave guidance on ERIA's 2022 activities.

At the meeting, the deputy minister appreciated the ERIA's achievements for 2021 and the proposal for 2022. Regarding the implementation of

the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) Agreement, he mentioned that Myanmar already entered into force bilaterally with 10 members of RCEP countries, and Cambodia, Laos and Myanmar

have been granted transition periods to fulfil the commitments of some RCEP provisions. Therefore, he requested ERIA to provide the capacity building programme for Myanmar, especially in institutional and legal

capacity enhancement within the transition period.

Officials from Foreign Economic Relations Department also attended the meeting.— MNA

Korean Air (KE) to resume YGN-Seoul-YGN flights on 6 July

KOREAN Air (KE) which has been suspended for more than two years due to the COVID-19 outbreak, will resume on 6 July. The airlines will resume Yangon-Seoul-Yangon weekly flights every Wednesday from 6 July.

From 17 April, when international flights and tourists were welcomed back to Myanmar, to the end of April, there were 6,455 arriving passengers and 9,593 departing passengers, according to the Department of Civil

Aviation.

In addition, it is reported that Thai Smile airlines will resume on 1 June, Air Asia on 3 June, and Nok Air on 1 July, respectively. The Myanmar National Airlines is also flying regularly to Singapore, Bangkok, and Kuala Lumpur, and the MAI is flying to Kuala Lumpur, Bangkok, Tokyo, Singapore, Seoul, Guangzhou, Dubai, Phnom Penh, and Kolkata on scheduled days. — TWA/GNLM

Kawthoung-Ranong border reopens on 1 June



THE Kawthoung-Ranong border post reopened on 1 June after more than two years of closure. Myanmar and Thailand have agreed to allow the people from the two countries to stay two-night three days with a border pass in Ranong, a town in southern Thailand.

Holders of PV passports, those who are going to study in Thailand, and those who have had a three-month visa from the Thai Embassy in Yangon are now able to go to Thailand through Kawthoung. As a travel expense, THB 500 for a boat fare

from Kawthoung to Ranong, K300 for a stamp in Myanmar and THB150 for Thailand.

Passport holders will not be required to pay THB2,000 as the deposit, while those who will visit Thailand for seven or 15 days will be required to pay the deposit and they will be able to withdraw it when they arrive back in Kawthoung, according to Ma Win Yi, a Ranong resident. On 24 May 222 Myanmar workers were sent to Thailand under the MoU system through the Kawthoung-Ranong border. — TWA/GNLM

About 220 shelters built in event of natural disasters in 11 regions/states

TO provide shelters for the people in the event of natural disasters, a total of 219 disaster-resistant buildings have been built in 11 regions and states, said Maj-Gen Zaw Min Tun, SAC Information Team Leader, at the 15th press conference of the State Administration Council.

“When it comes to cyclone news, the people are informed through the media; It is also necessary for the people to follow the precautionary measures of the relevant organizations; They should know the type and the route of the cyclone; The Chairman of the State Administration Council stressed to publish the cyclone information,” he said.

The government has set up 134 relief warehouses in various regions, including Nay Pyi Taw, to carry out disaster

relief work, and relief supplies are stored in advance for respective households. Of 219 shelters, 23 are under construction.

Motorboats and life jackets are made in advance for emergency response, search, rescue, and evacuation in the event of a natural disaster.

“As of May 2022, 496 motorboats have been deployed where needed. The Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services has ordered the regiments and units to respond to the natural disaster immediately without having to wait for the above order,” Maj-Gen Zaw Min Tun added. — TWA/GNLM

Dealers eye profits for surging onion prices

AS the price of onion becomes high in the Yangon market, it brings benefits to the onion brokers a lot, according to merchants of the Bayintnaung market.

“Today, the onion price is high at Bayintnaung wholesale. The price is K1,075 per viss of large size onion. Seikphyu onion is priced at K550-775-900-925. The

brokers get many profits,” said Ko Aung, an onion trader from the Naungpinlay Market.

On 1 June, Pakokku market received 76,000 viss of onion and all were sold out at K500-650-700-925 per viss. The Seikphyu market also received 15,000 viss of onion and sold at K475-550-685-775 per viss while 70,000 viss to Myingyan market and sold at

K900 per viss.

“The two sizes of large onion are on sale at K1,000 per viss at Monywa market. There are only 400 visses to the market this year although it received a million visses of onion last year,” said Ko Zaw Lin, onion importer to Pakokku wholesale centre.

Although the Pakokku wholesale centre received about

200,000 viss of onion on 23 June 2021, the onion from Pale was priced at K360 per viss while onion from Yaw was K335 per viss, according to the data of the wholesale centre.

The Seikphyu onion was priced at 175-300-350 per viss in the Yangon market on 1 June 2021, according to the data of the centre.

“The Myittha onion, not the kept ones, was priced at K800-1,100-1,400 per viss,” said purchaser Ko Chit Ko.

In 2022, the price of summer-season alone gyi htate sa onion was only K850 per viss in the Yangon market recently and it became K1,000 per viss as the price surged in the countryside. — TWA/GNLM

Over 91% of students joyfully study at 3,207 schools in Yangon

A total of 91.46 per cent of students were joyfully studying in 3,207 basic education schools in Yangon Region yesterday. There are 2,759 basic education schools, 229 monastic schools, and 219 private schools in 44 townships located in the Yangon Region, where a total of 732,034 students are currently studying.

COVID-19 disease prevention and clean-up of school environments are provided to enable students to study comfortably during the school opening season, and the government has distributed free textbooks, stationery, notebooks, and one

primary school uniform to each student. The Yangon Region government provided teachers and students with masks.

“When schools open today, teachers are happy to see their students. We are also delighted at seeing the happiness of the teachers. It is gratifying to see the parents of the students at the entrance of the school with happy smiles as they send their children to school,” said U Kyaw Moe Tun, an education officer at the Yangon Region Basic Education Department.

Yesterday, basic education schools were opened in the re-

gions and states at the same time. 800,395 students were enrolled and 91.46 per cent of them attended the schools in Yangon Region.

Schools reopened in Nay Pyi Taw for 2022-2023 Academic Year

THE government set school enrolment week for the 2022-2023 Academic Year from 26 May to 1 June and reopened the basic education schools (primary, middle, high) across the nation yesterday.

Similarly, the schools were opened in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area and the teachers conducted the health-related measures at the entrance of the schools.

Headmistress Daw Yamin Thu of No (8) BEHS said, “There were only about 1,000 students in the previous year and it did not exceed 1,000. Now, we expect

there would be about 1,200 students this year and there will be more enrollments. We will admit the enrollment of students during the school opening period until there is no restriction. We have enough classrooms if the number of enrollments is high. We made preparations at schools on 15 May for school enrollments. We have a medical room for students. The students who cannot make enrollment for two successive years miss two classes. Therefore, I want them to enrol on any situation.”

The government did not collect any charges for school enrollments and provided free education, stationeries and school uniforms to the students.

“Ninety per cent of high school students attend our school in addition 90 per cent of middle school students and 95 per cent of primary students. There are 1,231 students who enrolled at our school as of today. There are 1142 students today and so it shows 93 per cent of attendance. We cooperate with the officials and parents for the

Significant legal maxims and principles

INTRODUCTION What is law?

“Nobody is above the law”, and “equality before the law.”

1. Law is the regime that orders human activities and relations through the systematic application of the force of a politically organized society or social pressure, backed by force, in such a society. It is the legal system. Under Myanmar culture and civilization, the law is everybody’s concern, everybody’s business. There is an old saying in Myanmar: If freely translated, I think it may read: “a man may not live hundred years long, but he may be faced with over a hundred cases or problems 2. Oxford Advanced Learner’s Dictionary defines the term “law” as follows: -

Significant legal maxims and principles

1. Law is so wide, so delicate, so demanding, so difficult a subject that nobody could claim that he knows all the best about the laws. As such, may I, with some sort of legal background, present to you some of the significant legal maxims and principles as follows: -
1. The rule of law, law and order
2. Equality before the law, nobody is above the law.
3. The letter of the law, the spirit of the law.
4. Ignorance of the law is no excuse
5. Conflict of laws

“Law is the whole system of rules that everyone in a country or system must obey”. Thus, there is a legal maxim or principle:

1. The rule of law, law and or-

der

The incumbent government is not democratically elected. But together with the people, our incumbent government is carrying out a variety of tremendous tasks. And one of those tremendous tasks, I would like to present to you, with pride and glory as an ordinary citizen is, about the democratic people’s government’s noble aim and vision to set up a democratic federal union. And in connection with this article, may I present to you a relevant quotation as follows: “The first essential condition for making democracy secure in our lives” is to base all our activities, firmly on the rule of law. There are never two sets of law, one for those within and another for those outside the ruling party. Whoever breaks the laws, must take the consequences. The rule of law and equality before the law must prevail. Law and order are often equated with the rule of law, and in this equation, the punitive and deterrent functions

of law tend to be overemphasized”.

2. Equality before the law. Nobody is above the law

3. Regarding this legal maxim, I would like to quote a British author Fielding Hall’s impression of Burmese (Myanmar) people, mentioned in his book. “The soul of a people”. The learned author observed that “the Burmese are a community of equals”, in a sense that has probably never been known elsewhere”. And according to our traditional justice system, “the King was the mighty fountain-head of justice, though he was not himself above the law”.

4. Well, in explaining this legal maxim, “equality before the law” may I also mention its definition in Black’s Law Dictionary” as follows:

“Equality before the law” means the status or condition of being treated according to regularly established norms of justice” 1. And many constitutional laws prescribe the notion that all persons

are subject to the ordinary law of the land; administered by the ordinary law court and officials are not exempt from the general duty of obedience to the law3. And with reference to this legal maxim, may I present to you from the collection of my memories something about diplomatic immunity. Diplomatic immunity is the general exemption of diplomatic agents from the operation of local law or the law of the country where he is serving. But this immunity or exemption means only from procedural matters and not from legal liabilities. So, if a diplomatic agent had committed offences in the receiving state he would be declared as a “persona non-grata” and he would be called back by the sending state and then legal action would be taken against him. In essence, nobody is above the law.

3. The letter of the law, the spirit of the law

“The letter of the law” means the strictly literal meaning of the

law, rather than the intention or policy behind it. The spirit of the law means the general meaning or purpose of the law, as opposed to its literal content. So, the learned lawyers would like to advise and assert that when studying and applying the law, both the letter and spirit of the law should be studied and applied.

4. Ignorance of the law is no excuse

As stated in the introduction, the law is everybody’s business, everybody’s concern. Nobody could argue that I have committed such an act or such an offence, just because I do not know the law. Lack of knowledge about a legal requirement or prohibition is never an excuse in a criminal charge. In Latin, “ignorantia juris non excusant”.

5. Conflict of laws

A difference between the laws of a state or between the laws of different states or countries is

known as a conflict of laws. If there is a conflict of laws within a state, the later law shall prevail over the earlier law. And if there is a conflict between the laws of a state party to a convention and the stipulations of the convention, then those of the convention shall prevail.

Conclusion

To sum up, I would like to quote some relevant words of wisdom from our legal and literary giant Dr Maung Maung who mentioned in his book “Law and Custom in Burma and the Burmese Family” as follows: “Law is founded on morality and morality finds its foundation in the moral integrity of the individual. Law is not or must not be reduced to mere words in statute books and legal decisions, but the law is or should be an active, ceaseless social process that runs like a nerve system in the living society, and the bloodstream of law needs to be constantly renewed and nourished so that it may accommodate the

change in its continuity, youth in its age.” Our incumbent government is carrying out tremendous tasks, together with the people. These noble tasks include setting up a democratic federal union. And to quote two of the State Administration Council Nine objectives of political affairs “to build a Union based on democracy and federalism, through a disciplined and genuine democratic multiparty democratic system that is fair and just.” “To continue implementing the principle of peaceful co-existence among countries through independent, active and non-aligned foreign policy.” So, we need a new free and fair election under our 2008 Constitution. What do you say, sir? Thank you.

Pandemic hinders efforts to achieve universal energy access by 2030

The findings are from the 2022 edition of Tracking SDG 7: The Energy Progress Report, which monitors global efforts to achieve the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG 7) of ensuring affordable modern energy supply for everyone by 2030.

THE COVID-19 pandemic has slowed the progress towards universal access to electricity and clean cooking fuels and technology, according to a UN-sponsored report published on Wednesday.

Globally, 733 million people lack access to electricity, and 2.4 billion still cook using fuels that are harmful to their health and the environment.

The findings are from the 2022 edition of Tracking SDG 7: The Energy Progress Report, which monitors global efforts to achieve the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG 7) of ensuring affordable modern energy supply for everyone by 2030.

The study was produced by UN entities and partners, known as the SDG 7 custodian agencies, who urge governments and policymakers to step up action.

The impacts of COVID-19, such as lockdowns and supply chain disruptions, have affected progress towards SDG 7.

Those countries that are most vulnerable have been hit hardest. In Asia and Africa, almost 90 million people who previously had access to electricity cannot afford to pay for their basic energy needs.

Africans remain the least electrified in the world, with 568 million without access to electricity. The percentage of people without electricity in Sub-Saharan Africa rose from 71 per cent in 2018 to 77 per cent in 2020, while most other regions declined.

Moreover, the progress in access to clean cooking fuels and technologies, particularly in Sub-Saharan Africa, wasn’t enough to keep pace with population growth.

The report discovered that renewable energy was the only energy source that grew during the pandemic despite continued disruptions in economic activity and supply chains.

Despite this, countries most in need of electricity have been left behind – a

situation exacerbated by the fact that international financial flows declined for the second consecutive year.

SDG 7 also includes targets towards energy efficiency. From 2010 to 2019, global annual improvements in energy intensity averaged around 1.9 per cent, which is well below the levels needed to both meet the targets and to make up for lost ground.

The SDG 7 custodians are IRENA and the International Energy Agency, the United Nations Statistics Division, the World Bank, and the World Health Organization.

International community and policymakers were urged to preserve gains towards SDG 7, and to continue working towards affordable, reliable, sustainable, and modern energy for all. The focus should remain on countries most in need of assistance, according to the report.

Illegal timbers, fertilizers, fuel oil, foodstuffs, consumer goods and vehicles seized



SUPERVISED by the Anti-Illegal Trade Steering Committee, effective action is being taken to prevent illegal trade under the law.

A combined inspection team conducted inspections and captured 420 gallons of illegal fuel worth K4,074,000 and a vehicle (approximately K13,800,000) that carried these illegal items on 31 May. The action was taken under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law.

Moreover, on 1 June, the on-duty inspection team made inspections at the Mayanchaung Permanent Checkpoint and

confiscated K3,124,000 worth of foodstuffs that showed no official documents from an express bus. The action was taken under the Customs Law.

On 2 June, a combined team under the management of the Mon State Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force captured 2.7114 tonnes of illegal timbers worth K271,140 on the Chaunghngakwa-Tayana Road in Kyaikmaraw Township and action was taken under the Forest Law.

Similarly, on the same day, a team led by the General Administration Department seized 380 bags of illegal fertilizers worth

K13,300,000 from a truck and action was taken under the Export/Import Law.

On the same day, the on-duty team at the Kawkareik (Tadakyoe) Checkpoint captured two sets of air-conditioners worth K600,000 and various sandals worth K1,800,000 that showed no official documents from a vehicle and action was charged under the Customs Law.

Thus, five arrests worth approximately K36,969,140 were made on 31 May, 1 and 2 June, according to the Anti-Illegal Trade Steering Committee. — MNA

Drugs seized in some townships across Myanmar

A combined inspection team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force stopped and searched a motorbike driven by Htun Myint Oo accompanied by Ma Nyunt Nyunt Htwe (aka) Mi An in Mongs Township on 30 May at noon. They captured 66 kilograms of heroin.

At 6:30 pm on the same day, Police Force examined a motorbike driven by Htet Zaw Moe (alias) Mae Lone on the Hpa-an-Eindu Road in Hpa-an Township and seized 4,000 stimulant tablets.

In addition, at 6:30 pm on 30 May, the Anti-Drug Police Force searched a passenger vehicle driven by Thant Zin Aung with Nyan Phone Myint and Thant Zin aboard on the Pulaw Bridge in Pulaw Township and confiscated 200,000 stimulant tablets.

Similarly, a combined

team consisting of members of the security force examined a Toyota Mark II car on the Mandalay-Lashio Road in Nawngkhio Township at 5:00 am on 31 May. They captured 8,000 stimulant tablets from passenger Ko Ye (aka) Myint Naing Oo.

Moreover, at 6:30 pm on the same day, the combined inspection team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force stopped and searched a Toyota Hilux Vigo car driven by Shaung Sei (alias) Le Shaung Sei with Ma Aye Chan Nyein on the Ywangan-Han Myintmo Road in Ywangan Township. They seized 10 kilograms of solid opium extract.

They are prosecuted under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law, the Myanmar Police Force stated. — MNA

Drugs seized in Loilem township

A combined team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force stopped and searched a Toyota Fielder car driven by Kyaw Kyaw Khaing on the Loilem-Taunggyi Road near Hotint village in Loilem Township and seized 112,000

stimulant tablets at 12:30 pm on 1 June.

K750 million worth of drugs in Pyigyidagun township

K750 million worth of heroin and stimulant tablets were captured in Pyigyidagun Township of Mandalay Region, according to the Police Force.

A combined inspection team consisting of members of the Anti-Drug Police Force searched a warehouse on 52ndx53rd streets, 139th street in Pyigyidagun Township, according to information. Police found Hein Win Soe and Tar Ro Sae with a Hino 12-wheel car and a Nissan van. They captured over K750 million worth of 9.9 kilograms of heroin and 0.336 million stimulant tablets from a Hino 12-wheel car on 30 May at 1:30 pm.

According to the examination, they admitted the drugs to be carried from Shan State to Mandalay Region. Police are investigating, and the suspects

were prosecuted under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law, the Myanmar Police Force stated. — MNA

Myanmar ships over 404,000 MT of rice in past two months

MYANMAR delivered over 404,453 metric tonnes of rice and broken rice in the past two months this year (April-May), according to the Myanmar Rice Federation-MRF.

In the past two months, a total of 35 exporter companies delivered over 391,580 MT of rice to foreign trade partners through sea trade, whereas 12,873 MT were sent to neighbouring countries via border posts. The export volume in cross-border trade significantly plunged compared to the previous year's record owing to trade delays triggered by China's strict border rules. Myanmar shipped rice and broken rice to China, regional countries, countries in Africa and European Union member countries through maritime trade.

Myanmar exported rice to around 20 foreign markets, most-

ly to China (35,121 MT), Cameroon (34,000 MT), the Philippines (28,460 MT), Poland (24,155 MT) and Madagascar (22,000 MT).

Additionally, Myanmar conveyed over 47,100 MT of broken rice to China, 37,204 MT to Bel-

gium, 25,000 MT to Spain, 19,100 MT to Poland and 14,790 to the Netherlands respectively and over 700 MT to other four markets respectively.

The prices of rice for the export market are rocketing on

low supply, according to the Bayintnaung Rice Wholesale Depot.

The prices of low-quality white rice varieties were approximately US\$320-360 per MT depending on the different varieties and quality. The export price

of Myanmar's rice was relatively lower than the rates of Thailand and Viet Nam. Yet, the prices were higher than those of market prices of India and Pakistan, MRF's data showed. The export rice prices (Low Quality) move in the range of K29,000 and K30,000 per 108-pound bag depending on different varieties in the domestic market, according to Bayintnaung Commodity Centre.

Myanmar has shipped more than 1.4 million tonnes of rice and broken rice to foreign trade partners between 1 October and 31 March in the past mini-budget period (2021-2022), the Myanmar Rice Federation stated.

Myanmar also generated an income of US\$700 million from two million tonnes of rice exports to the foreign countries in the past 2020-2021 financial year. — KK/GNLM

Ywangan locals implement marketable soybean cultivation on manageable scale

THE growers in Yehla village of Myinkyadoe village-tract in Ywangan Township, are cultivating commercially valued soybean on a manageable scale.

As it is a lucrative crop, the growers are adding more acres. Earlier, the yield of the native soybean variety was low. At present, they are widely cultivating the highly-yielding Yezin 14 soybean variety which is a hybrid seed produced by the Agricultural Research Department.

A 90-day soybeans cultivation starts in June and ends in early October (in the pre-Thadingyut period).

About 6-8 Pyi (a pyi equals eight tins of condensed milk) are utilized per acre. The distance between plants is 2 feet. The locals use organic fertiliz-

ers such as soil compost and cattle manure. After 35-45 days, fertilizer treatment is made before the blossom of flowers. Although there is a pest threat, they can prevent it with the right amount of pesticide on time. The growers have to consider weather conditions, land type, seeds, pest control and systematic farming methods.

The soybean like pH of 5.5 and 6.6. It is highly yielded at 20 °C to 30 °C. A soybean plant can produce about 40-60 seed pods (a pod includes three seeds). The yield rate is 15-20 baskets per acre. It is worth K2,200-2,500 per viss (a viss equals 1.6 kilograms). The soybeans from Ywangan are delivered to the commodity centres in Aungban, said a grower. — Pyay Phy Thant/GNLM

Rubber price edges up to approximately K1,200 per pound

THE prices of rubber returned to rise to around K1,200 per pound, rubber traders said.

In early April, sundried rubber sheet (Local 3) was worth K1,235 per pound and ribbed smoked sheet Local 3 fetched K1,255 per pound. The prices gradually declined and reached K1,050 per pound for sundried sheets and K1,070 per pound for ribbed smoked sheets.

Additionally, rubber production usually drops in April. The market was sluggish in the post-Thingyan period as well.

Rubber prices in Mon State are heavily relying on the

Global demand for rubber, rubber production of the Southeast Asian nations and their market supply are contributing factors to the rubber price condition of Mon State, a major producing state in Myanmar, traders elaborated.

Rubber prices climbed up in the monsoon season on strong demand when there was low supply in the previous years. However, the rubber price is likely to go downwards owing to the Central Bank of Myanmar's currency policy and negative consequences, traders shared their opinions.

Nonetheless, the rubber

price has risen these days. The prices of rubber stand at K1,140 per pound for sundried rubber Local 3 and K1,160-K1,170 per pound for ribbed smoked sheet Local 3.

Rubber is commonly produced in Mon and Kayin states and Taninthayi, Bago, and Yango regions in Myanmar. As per 2018-2019 rubber season data, there are over 1.628 million acres of rubber plantations in Myanmar, with Mon State accounting for 497,153 acres, followed by Taninthayi Region with

348,344 acres and Kayin State with 270,760 acres. About 300,000 tonnes of rubber are produced annually across the country. Seventy per cent of rubber produced in Myanmar goes to China. It is also shipped to Singapore, Indonesia, Malaysia, Viet Nam, the Republic of Korea, India, Japan, and other countries.

Myanmar shipped 303,293 metric tons of rubber to its foreign trade partners and generated more than US\$449 million in revenue in the previous financial year 2020-2021. — NN/GNLM

India growth slows on inflation, higher oil prices

INDIA'S growth slowed further in the first three months of 2022, the National Statistics Office said Tuesday, with inflation and higher oil prices denting a post-pandemic recovery.

Asia's third-largest economy grew 4.1 per cent, year-on-year, in the last quarter, NSO data showed.

Annual growth for the 12 months to the end of March stood at 8.7 per cent.

Rising global commodity prices have sparked concern

among policymakers, with India's central bank announcing its first interest rate hike in nearly four years this month.

The country of 1.4 billion people imports more than 80 per cent of its crude oil and the cost of meeting domestic fuel demand has soared since Russia invaded Ukraine in February.

India is also the world's largest importer of edible oils, prices of which are at record highs since the conflict began.

"The pandemic may be receding, but growth has not returned," economist Mihir Swarup Sharma of the New Delhi-based Observer Research Foundation told AFP.

"Instead, imports as a proportion of GDP -- driven by higher prices for food, fuel, and other commodities -- are rising."

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government this month announced tax breaks to offset higher food and petrol costs.—AFP

Singaporeans in a flap at Malaysian chicken export curbs



A day before the export curbs kicked in, Singaporeans flocked to the city's food courts to get a taste of their favourite chicken rice ahead of a feared hike in prices. **PHOTO: AFP**

LONG queues at stalls selling a popular chicken dish, increasing prices and warnings about supply disruptions -- Singaporeans are in a flap due to curbs on poultry exports from neighbouring Malaysia.

Malaysia's move to halt exports of 3.6 million chickens a month, which kicks in Wednesday,

is the latest protectionist move in Asia aimed at tackling domestic shortages and taming surging inflation.

But the surprise step has caused consternation in Singapore, a tiny city-state that relies on its larger neighbour for a good chunk of food imports, including around a third of its chicken.

Of particular concern is the impact on chicken rice, a hugely popular dish of poached chicken, rice and chili dip, often sold at the city-state's ubiquitous open-air food courts.

Chicken prices "will definitely go up", said Foo Kui Lian, founder of Tian Tian Hainanese Chicken Rice, one of the best-known stalls selling the dish in Singapore.

"If (suppliers) raise prices by a lot we would have to raise ours a bit, or it'll be difficult for us to survive."

A day before the export curbs kicked in, a long queue formed at the stall as diners sought to get a taste of the dish before a feared surge in prices.

Office worker Meilan Lim was among those who bought the dish ahead of the restrictions.

"Even though I'm not really a chicken rice person, it's just that sometimes you do have the craving," she told AFP.—AFP

China's factories creep back to life as Covid curbs ease

THE contraction gripping China's manufacturing sector slowed in May, data showed Tuesday, as some factories gradually resumed work after the easing of strict Covid lockdowns.

The Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) -- a key gauge of manufacturing activity -- edged up to 49.6, officials said, from April's 47.4, which was the worst reading since early 2020.

However, the reading remained stuck below the 50-point mark separating growth from contraction. The figures come as Beijing's zero-Covid policy aimed at stamping out infections with lockdowns and mass testing is challenged by a surge in the fast-spreading Omicron variant. Dozens of cities, including economic powerhouses Shanghai and Shenzhen, have been either fully or partially sealed off in recent months, prompting warnings of the gouge to growth being made by zero-Covid.—AFP

Netherlands, Germany to jointly drill for gas in North Sea

THE Netherlands and Germany will jointly drill for a new gas field in the North Sea, the Dutch Ministry of Economic Affairs and Climate announced on Wednesday.

State Secretary Hans Vijlbrief has "issued permits for the Dutch part today," said the ministry in a statement. The permits will be "available for inspection online" from Friday, and an "accelerated procedure" for the required permits is underway in Germany.—Xinhua

EU's Russian oil ban unlikely to affect OPEC+ decision

SAUDIA Arabia, Russia and their allies are likely to stick to their policy of modest oil output increases when they meet Thursday after the EU banned most imports from Moscow.

European Union leaders agreed on Monday to ban more than two-thirds of Russian oil imports, tightening economic

screws on the country over its invasion of its neighbour Ukraine.

This has caused oil prices, which have already hit record highs so far this year, to soar further amid pressure on the 23-member OPEC+ to open tabs more widely and relieve the market.

Brent, the international

benchmark, hit a two-month high above \$124 per barrel while the US contract, WTI, topped \$119.

But analysts say OPEC+ will stick to its strategy of only slightly increasing output when it holds its monthly videoconference on Thursday as it remains united with Moscow.—AFP

Forbes terminates plan to go public through merger

BUSINESS news publication Forbes announced Wednesday that it has pulled the plug on a merger transaction with a specially created investment company as fewer of such deals get completed.

Forbes said that its shareholders had terminated the transaction with Magnus Opus Acquisition Limited. The media company gave no reason for the shift but expressed confidence in its future.

“The Forbes brand is a sought-after and trusted brand with more than 100 years of equity that is synonymous with success and validation,” said Forbes Chief Executive Mike Federle, who pointed to double-digit revenue growth over the past year.

Forbes had announced the deal in August 2021,

envisioning raising about \$600 million through the union with Magnus Opus, a special-purpose acquisition company (SPAC),

Magnum Opus is a shell investment vehicle set up specifically to merge with an operating company

that entered public markets in March 2021.

First established around 30 years ago, SPACs became a popular means of entering public markets in 2020 and 2021 amid low interest rates and surging equity mar-

kets.

But the shift in Federal Reserve to a tightening monetary policy has slowed the arrival of new public companies as the stock market as a whole has struggled in 2022. — AFP

Abu Dhabi moves to restrict single-use plastics

RESTRICTIONS on single-use plastic bags took effect in the United Arab Emirates capital Abu Dhabi Wednesday, as part of its efforts for a “greener future”.

The “single-use plastic bags ban starts today... to encourage sustainable living in Abu Dhabi”, the emirate’s media office said. “Retailers in the emirate are encouraged to offer environmentally friendly reusable bags with a nominal fee to encourage positive behavioural change in the community, and support emirate-wide efforts for a greener future.” There are exemptions for medicine bags, bag rolls for produce in supermarkets, rubbish sacks and large brand name shopping bags.

The restrictions come

as the UAE prepares to host the COP28 global environmental conference in 2023, having set a target to become carbon neutral by 2050, in line with goals set by the COP26 conference in Britain last year.

Dubai, one of the seven other emirates that make up the UAE, has also announced it is ending the free provision of single-use plastic bags. The decision is scheduled to come into force at the start of July.

Like its Gulf neighbours, the UAE’s economy is largely dependent on fossil fuels.

A report submitted to the World Government Summit in Dubai in February 2019 said the UAE consumes 11 billion plastic bags a year, the Environment Agency – Abu Dhabi has said.—AFP

Gunmaker Ruger shareholders demand report on impact of firearms

SHAREHOLDERS of gunmaker Sturm Ruger voted Wednesday for the company to prepare a report on the human rights impact of its business, following a series of recent deadly mass shootings in the United States.

The manufacturer’s annual meeting approved a proposal by members of the Interfaith Centre on Corporate Responsibility, which are also shareholders of Sturm Ruger, that calls for a human rights impact assessment, the ICCR

said in a statement.

“Proponents successfully made the case to their fellow shareholders that gunmakers could not abdicate their roles and responsibilities in helping to stem the carnage perpetrated with the products they sell

to the public,” ICCR said.

Sturm Ruger, founded in 1949, did not immediately confirm to AFP the outcome of the vote.

The gun manufacturer had called for members to oppose the proposal, which is non-binding.—AFP

US lifts restrictions on air links to Cuba

THE US government lifted restrictions Wednesday on air links to Cuba, one of the measures announced in May by President Joe Biden's administration in a gesture of conciliation towards the Communist-run island.

The decision will allow US airlines to serve other airports in Cuba aside from the capital Havana, a Department of Transportation document said.

The re-authorization of certain group trips is also planned, it said.

On 16 May, the Biden administration announced the upcoming lifting of a slew of sanctions targeting the island, which a US official described at the time as "practical decisions" to help alleviate the humanitarian situation and to "expand economic opportunities" for Cubans.

In addition to expanded flights, the United States intends to reinstate a programme that was suspended for several years and which had facilitated immigration procedures for

members of the same family.

Washington had also promised to increase capacity for processing visa applications in Havana.

It will also abolish a quarterly ceiling of \$1,000 that was permitted to be sent to Cuba by relatives in the US, and will also authorize the sending of money outside of family members.

That ceiling was imposed by Biden's predecessor Donald Trump, who took a series of measures against Cuba during his presidency. —AFP

Parts of Ukraine could vote to join Russia in summer: lawmaker

MOSCOW-CONTROLLED areas of southern Ukraine could stage a referendum to become part of Russia as early as July, a senior Russian lawmaker said Wednesday.

Ukraine has accused Moscow of plotting to stage sham independence referendums in the southern regions of Kherson and Zaporizhzhia. "I don't rule out that this may happen as early as July," said Leonid Slutsky, the head of parliament's foreign affairs committee and a senior member of Moscow's team of negotiators with Ukraine. "I won't predict where it will take place, but I assume that the liberated territories will hold a referendum more or less simultaneously," Slutsky said in comments carried by Russian news agencies. —AFP

Danes begin voting on joining EU's common defence policy

TRADITIONALLY eurosceptic Denmark began voting Wednesday in a referendum on whether to overturn its opt-out on the EU's common defence policy after Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

The vote comes on the heels of neighbouring Finland's and Sweden's historic applications for NATO membership, as the Ukraine war forces countries in Europe to rethink their security policies. —AFP

'No to wheat as weapon of war', pope says

POPE Francis on Wednesday pleaded against the use of grain as a weapon of war, as fears grow

over a global food crisis caused by Russia's invasion of Ukraine. "Of great concern is the

blockade of grain exports from Ukraine, on which the lives of millions of people depend, especially in the poorest countries," Francis said at the end of his weekly general audience.

"Please do not use wheat, a staple food, as a weapon of war!" he said.

The pontiff appealed for "every effort to be made" to "guarantee the universal right to food".

Russia's offensive in Ukraine and Western sanctions have disrupted deliveries of wheat and other commodities from the two countries, fuelling concerns about the risk of hunger around the world.

Russia and Ukraine produce around 30 per cent of the global wheat supply. —AFP

Pro-Russia separatists claim gains outside Ukraine's Avdiivka

KREMLIN-BACKED separatists in Ukraine on Wednesday claimed they were edging closer to completely encircling the eastern town of Avdiivka after cutting off one of its two main roads.

Together with pro-Moscow separatists, Russian troops have been ramping up attacks on Ukraine's eastern Donbas region that has seen heavy fighting since the start of Russia's military campaign in Ukraine.

The village of Novosselovka 2, located on the outskirts of Avdiivka, "has been liberated" and separatist forces "have taken control of a portion" of the nearby highway, the militia of the self-proclaimed Donetsk People's Republic said on messaging app Telegram.

It added that separatists have "finally cut off the Avdiivka garrison from one of the two available supply routes".

AFP could not independently verify these claims.

Avdiivka is an industrial town north of the separatist-controlled city of Donetsk, the de-facto capital of the Donetsk People's Republic.

Taking Avdiivka would mark a symbolic victory for Russia and would open the way to the Ukraine-controlled city of Kramatorsk, located about 100 kilometres (60 miles) away. —AFP

The 'predatory' global economy of looted antiquities

THE charging of the Louvre's former director in an antiquities trafficking investigation has shone a light on a vast, transnational criminal problem that remains fiendishly difficult to target.

Ancient burial grounds around the world have increasingly become "open-air supermarkets" for everyone from petty thieves to organized criminals, said Vincent Michel, professor of archaeology at the University of Poitiers in France.

He describes a "sophisticated chain" stretching from sites in unstable places such as Iraq, Syria and Libya — but also many other parts of the world — via transit countries to auction houses and private collectors in Europe and the United States, and increasingly Asia and the Gulf.

It is an illicit trade that "serves mafias, drug traffickers and terrorist groups, abusing collectors and museums with complete impunity", said Michel.

The ex-director of the Louvre in Paris, Jean-Luc Martinez, was charged last week over the purchase of a pink granite stele depicting the pharaoh Tutankhamun and four other histor-

ic works for eight million euros (\$8.5 million) by the museum's branch in Abu Dhabi.

Martinez, who has strongly denied any wrong-doing, is accused of turning a blind eye to fake certificates of origin for the pieces, a fraud thought to involve several other art experts, according to French investigative weekly *Canard Enchaîné*.

Such allegations are far from a rarity in the art world where the value of looted antiquities is thought to reach into the "tens or even hundreds of millions of euros" per year, ac-

ording to Michel.

He trains police, judges and customs officials to help counter the trade but resources are notoriously limited in the sector, and he has called for deeper public awareness and a more concerted interdisciplinary fight.

"This transnational crime feeds a predatory economy that undermines our national security. It is also an irreversible attack on heritage because a looted object, taken out of its context, loses all scientific value," Michel said.—AFP

Yemen truce hangs in balance as extension talks falter

A fragile UN-brokered truce between the Yemeni government and Huthi rebels hung in the balance Wednesday as talks on renewing it hit trouble, threatening the humanitarian gains of the past two months.

Aid agencies and Western governments have urged Yemen's warring parties to extend the truce, which has significantly reduced the intensity of fighting in a conflict the United Nations says has triggered the world's worst humanitarian crisis.

But with just one day before the truce expires, there was no sign of any breakthrough in UN-backed talks.

A Yemeni aircraft left the rebel-held capital Sanaa for Cairo on the first commercial flight between the two cities since 2016, the latest gain from the truce deal.

The office of the United Nations special envoy for Yemen told AFP there were 77 people on board the Yemenia flight from Sanaa airport, which has been closed to commercial flights for nearly six years. It is the seventh such flight since the truce went into effect on 2 April. The six previous flights had all been to the Jordanian capital Amman.—AFP

Anti-femicide group goes on trial in Turkey

A prominent Turkish anti-femicide campaign group went on trial on Wednesday accused of activity against law and morals, with several hundred women rallying outside Istanbul's main court in protest.

Prosecutors had filed a lawsuit in April against We Will Stop Femicide Platform, one of the country's leading feminist organizations. If convicted, the group could be shut down. Protesters outside the court waved banners bearing slogans such as "You will never walk alone!" and "We will stop women's murders", alongside the families of women murdered by men. We Will Stop Femicide Platform has been campaigning against the murder and abuse of women since its foundation in 2010.—AFP

Deadly clashes break out in WB over Israeli demolition

A Palestinian young man was killed and six were injured on Wednesday during clashes with the Israeli soldiers near the northern West Bank city of

Jenin, reported Xinhua, quoting Palestinian health authorities.

The Palestinian Health Ministry said in a press state-

ment that Bilal Kabaha, 24, was killed after he was shot by Israeli soldiers in the chest and leg during clashes in the village of Ya'bad, west of the Jenin city.

It added that six other young men were injured by live ammunition, including one shot in the abdomen and the other in the face. The two casualties were transferred to the hospital, and are in critical condition, the statement said.

Palestinian eyewitnesses said clashes broke out when an Israeli army force stormed the village with a bulldozer to demolish the home of Deya'a Hamarsheh, a Palestinian who carried out a shooting attack in Tel Aviv that killed five Israelis on 29 March.—Xinhua

South Korean ruling party wins landslide in local elections

SOUTH Korea's ruling party won a landslide victory in local elections for leaders of major cities and provinces, official results showed Thursday, giving newly elected president Yoon Suk-yeol a significant boost.

An avowed anti-feminist and political novice, Yoon won the March presidential election by just 0.7 per cent — the narrowest margin ever — and faces an opposition-controlled National Assembly that has vowed to closely scrutinize his policies.

But Yoon's People Power Party won 12 of the 17 major posts up for grabs in elections held Wednesday for mayors and provincial governors, in-

cluding the capital Seoul and the country's second largest city, Busan.

The PPP's current Seoul mayor, Oh Se-hoon, was re-elected with 59 per cent of the vote, while the PPP's Park Heong-joon was re-elected mayor of Busan with 66.4 per cent.

Yoon thanked South Koreans for the "successful completion" of the elections on Thursday.

"I want to accept the results of this election as the will of the people to revive the economy and take better care of the people's livelihood," Kang In-sun, Yoon's spokeswoman, quoted him as saying.—AFP
