IT is announced that the statements to public, orders, notifications, and directives (excluding eased restrictions) of Union-level organizations and Union ministries effective until 30 June 2020 for prevention, control and treatment of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) will be extended to 15 July 2020 as it is required to continue containment of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19).

Greening activities in progress in Nay Pyi Taw

U Ohn Win, Union Minister for Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation, inspected greening activities at Phohsaungtaung reserve and Ngalike reserve in Nay Pyi Taw

Council Area, and Ngalike elephant camp yesterday.

At Phohsaungtaung reserve, the Union Minister examined a plot for greening programme, and viewed the growing of grass of a certain kind and bamboo at the places where erosion can take place. He spoke of the need to grow more such grass and bamboo. Afterwards, he inspected the thriving bamboo plants at the greening plantation in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area.

During the inspection of Ngalike reserve, Union Minister U Ohn Win observed a 150-acre commercial team plantation set up in 2018, weeding at another 150-acre teak plantation set up in 2019, test plantation of teak through pot tube system. He instructed officials to record the growth rate of the test plantation

and to conduct weeding systematically.

The Union Minister stressed the need to replace dead saplings with the new ones at the plantations, keep systematic records of the plantations, financial accounts and statistic and keep office equipment systematically during visit to two 100-acre plantations one established in 2019 and the other in 2020 for ecosystem conservation, with the help of Myanmar Gems and Jewelry Entrepreneurs Association.

The Union Minister was conducted around the Ngalike elephant camp by officials who presented a report on laying of a forest track and a beach track, and erection of a pontoon bridge, a suspension bridge and two gorge-crossing bridges. —MNA

Quality education calls for collective efforts: Union Minister

BASED on the assessment reports, requirements for COVID-19 prevention and containment programmes at schools will be fulfilled before the start of the new academic year, said Union Minister for Education Dr Myo Thein Gyi at a meeting in Nay Pyi Taw on 26 this month.

Speaking at the meeting held at his ministry in connection with the reopening of schools, the Union Minister said as the school reopening date is set on 21 July, officials at all levels should facilitate arrangements for the adequacy of classrooms, desks, text books, exercise books, hand-washing basins, hand gel, toilets, non-contact

infrared thermometers, based on student population, reusable masks, and PPE rooms at the schools. He also dealt with the maintenance work, health awareness campaigns, teaching courses, the minimum number of teachers and the maximum seating capacity of a classroom, curriculum assessment and backup plans.

The Union Minister said stipends for students of the low-income bracket families will be increased, and the school enrolment weeks will be conducted in accordance with the COVID-19 prevention and containment rules. Quality education calls for collective effort. The ministry

will open the schools as it does not want the students to lose their education opportunities, he noted.

Deputy Minister U Win Maw Tun explained measures

for the success of the education programmes when the schools reopen.

Then, officials of the education sector presented matters in connection with financial allot-

ments, development undertakings, health and safety measures at schools, and enrolment weeks. The Union Minister looked into the requirements. —MNA

Fifth batch of Myanmar citizens repatriated from Malaysia

A total of 169 Myanmar nationals — 150 stranded in Malaysia, and 19 migrant workers who face difficulty to go to the work-site of Peck Chew Pilling (M) SdnBhd Company in Klang, Selangor State, Malaysia — were brought back yesterday.

Myanmar Airways International (MAI)'s relief flight had carried the Myanmar citizens to the Yangon International Airport.

The Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population, the Ministry of Health and Sports and the Yangon Region government provided the returnees proper medical examination and arranged 21-day quarantine for them.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs is working in line with the guidelines set by the National Central Committee on Prevention, Control and

Treatment of Coronavirus Disease 2019 and cooperating with relevant ministries, Myanmar embassies abroad to repatriate Myanmar citizens stranded in other countries due to COVID-19.

Until now a total of 639 Myanmar citizens stranded in Malaysia have been brought back home. —MNA

UEC assures equal opportunities for all parties in accord with laws and rules

THE Union Election Commission (UEC) and political parties held talks at Melia Hotel in Yangon yesterday morning on the successful holding of the coming 2020 General Election.

During the talks, Chairman of UEC U Hla Thein said the election for the third term of the Hluttaw will be held in the late 2020. Myanmar is now making all-inclusive efforts against COVID-19, which is a global pandemic. The designation and announcement of the date for 2020 General Election may depend on the degree of success in preventing and containing COVID-19. In accordance with the parliamentary procedure, the election date will be fixed and announced after Hluttaw-wise constituencies have been issued. The number of political parties listed for the coming general elections till now is 97. The UEC is arranging a series of meetings with political parties in all seriousness. The UEC is holding meetings with the participation of political

parties, social organizations and its officials at regions and states for the parties to present their aspirations one after another in time, instead of forwarding them all at the time when they meet the UEC. While the UEC is in the process of meeting will political parties, a group formed with 30 of them asked 12 questions. As the 12 questions are concerned

with all the legal parties, and not only those 30, they will be explained here.

The UEC in office has held the elections, better than the former ones. It has already made public that the coming general elections will be held under five norms. It is working with the aim of improving the elections, and promised a fair election that en-

sures equal opportunities for all parties under the laws and rules in force, the UEC chair said, and requested the parties to try to win seats in the elections as the ones that can be put to test. UEC will hold a free and fair elections in 2020 that is transparent and that meets the aspirations of the public desire, he assured.

The UEC chair and mem-

bers gave answers and clarifications in response to the suggestions and questions raised by the political parties. The UEC chair gave the concluding remarks.

Officials of Commission Office and Yangon Region election sub-commission and 81 political parties and guests were also present.—MNA ■

Insolvency Practitioners' Regulatory Council holds meeting in Yangon

INSOLVENCY Practitioners' Regulatory Council held its first meeting for 2020 at the training school of the Union Auditor-General's Office in Yangon on 26 June.

At the meeting, Union Auditor-General U Maw Than recounted the establishment of the council on 26 March 2020 under notification 25/2020, and dealt with the formation of the practitioner certification committee, the practitioner disciplinary committee, the advisory committee or the executive committee and the council office for the effectiveness of the council's functions. He said the regulatory committee should be formed with advocates for legal matters, accountants for financial matters, and economists for the functions. The Union Au-

ditor-General called for inclusive participation for the successful enforcement of the Insolvency Law, which has eleven parts.

The chairman of the Bar Council, the governor of the Central Bank of Myanmar, the president of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry, a member of Securities and Exchange Commission, the patron, the chairman and the members of board of Myanmar Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and the head of the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration, who are members of the Insolvency Practitioners' Regulatory Council, took part in the discussions.

The meeting elected the Un-

Over 140,000 unemployed in coronavirus pandemic crisis

WITH the suspension or withdrawal of more than 5,700 factories, workplaces and restaurants, more than 140,000 people have become unemployed during coronavirus period, said Deputy Minister U Myint Kyaing of the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population.

Moreover, over 250 big factories and workplaces are also shut down, he said at the press briefing on the government's fourth-year performances held

at the Ministry of Information in Nay Pyi Taw on 26 June.

"During the coronavirus period, more than 100,000 overseas workers came back to Myanmar. A total of 5,658 factories, workplaces and restaurants were closed including over 250 large factories and workplaces. The suspension, withdrawal and closure of the factories and workplaces have rendered over 140,000 people unemployed," he stated.

"If we add over 100,000 workers who are coming back from abroad to the list of the unemployed, there will be over 200,000 people unemployed during this period," U Myo Aung, the permanent secretary for the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population.

During the pandemic period, the ministry took legal action in respect of 25 cases concerning the factories and workplaces for disobedience of government in-

structions, he added.

Additionally, those workers who have come back from abroad are getting registered in the related regional labour offices to seek a job, said the deputy minister.

From March to June during the pandemic period, more than 110,000 repatriates came back from Thailand, Korea, Japan and China. —Aye Maung

Over 98,000 acres of monsoon paddy to grow in Kyaukse, Singaing

WITH the cultivation mainly done through irrigation system in Kyaukse Township in Mandalay Region, a total of 56,207 acres

of monsoon paddy will be grown in Kyaukse township whereas 41,972 acres of the same will be grown in Singaing township.

Previously, the local farmers from Kyaukse township did the farming supplying the water through Namkham, Nga Pyaung,

Thindwe, Min Ye, Zeetaw and Ht-one Gyi dams. This year, a total of 562,017 acres of monsoon paddy will be grown with 7,731 acres having the water from Namkham dam, 27,006 acres with the water supplied by Nga Pyaung dam, 7,892 acres with the water from Thindwe dam, 9,692 acres with the water supplied from Min Ye dam, 881 acres with the water from Zeetaw dam and 3,005 acres with the water supplied from Ht-one Gyi dam.

Moreover, a total of 41,972 acres of monsoon paddy will be grown in Singaing with 3,105 acres of land will be put under cultivation with the water supplied from Thindwe dam, 6,357 acres with the water from Min Ye dam, 8,641 acres with the water from Min Ye dam, 13,570 acres with the water from Zeetaw dam and 10,299 acres with the water from Zeetaw dam, according to the District Irrigation and Water Utilization Management Department.—Thet Maung (District-IPRD)

Chindwin ferries charge usual fares even half passengers onboard

THE ferries cruising along Chindwin River in Monywa are now resuming their service with usual fares although they carry only half passengers onboard, said U Myo Nyunt Tun, the officer in charge of MGRG ferry service.

"The ferries started to run beginning on 18 June. The cargo ferries resumed their service on 8 June. Only half of

the accommodation capacity is allowed to use on the ferries. However, we didn't change the water ferry fares.

The price of fuel oil is on the decline in our joy. So, we can operate the ferries with usual fares," he added.

Out of the six ferries, three are running in the morning and the rest three in the evening. They are daily cruising along

Chindwin River from Kani to Homalin. There will be ten water ferries running daily if Min Kin route is to be included.

"There will be more passengers on weekdays. The ferries are operating under a contract system according to the terms of which they have to run if it is their turn whether there are enough passengers or not. If the ferry boats refuse to

run, their turn will be jumped," he stated.

The fare of the ferry is K15,000 for Monywa-Homalin, K13,000 for Monywa-Phaung Pyin, K10,000 for Monywa-Mawlaik, K8,000 for Monywa-Kalaywa, K6,000 for Monywa-Minkin routes.—Myo Win Tun (Monywa)



All of them came back home in their own arrangements with the permission of Myanmar Embassy in the Kingdom.

BRINGING THE PANDEMIC UNDER CONTROL

Global partners require \$31 billion to speed up COVID-19 medicines for all

MORE than \$31 billion is needed over the next 12 months to develop medicines that will be effective against COVID-19, and make them available to all people, the World Health Organization (WHO) and partners said on Friday.

Ahead of a major pledging summit, they updated journalists on a recently announced initiative to speed up production of these treatments, known as the Access to COVID-19 Tools (ACT) Accelerator.

"It's clear that to bring this pandemic under control, and to save lives, we need effective vaccines, diagnostics and therapeutics – in unprecedented quantities and at unprecedented speed", WHO chief Tedros Adhanom said.

Access for all

The ACT Accelerator

was launched at the end of April, bringing together governments, health organizations, scientists, businesses, civil society and philanthropists.

Members work across four pillars: diagnostics, therapeutics, vaccines, and what they call "the health system connector".

They have outlined a plan that sees low- and middle-income countries receiving 500 million diagnostic tests, 245 million courses of treatments, and two billion vaccine doses, before the end of next year.

Race for a vaccine

The UN Health agency this week warned that the global COVID-19 caseload was approaching 10 million. So far, more than 484,000 people have died from the disease.

A safe and effective

vaccine is the only way to prevent further spread and transmission of the new coronavirus, according to Dr Soumya Swaminathan, Chief Scientist at WHO.

Although it normally takes up to 10 years to develop and manufacture a vaccine, the partners are looking to significantly shorten that timeline.

"We're aiming for 12, maximum of 18 months. And that would be unprecedented", said Dr Swaminathan. "The good news is we have over 200 candidates at some stage of clinical development; about 15 of them are actually now in human clinical trials."

ACT now

WHO and partners will need \$31.3 billion to achieve their goals. So far, \$3.4 billion has been received.

"This is an investment

worth making, more than any other we can think of", said Dr. Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala, one of the two Special Envoys for the ACT Accelerator.

"If we don't rally now, the human costs and eco-

nomie pain will deepen. So, though these numbers sound big, they are not when we think of the alternatives."

The European Commission will host a pledging summit on Saturday to sup-

port the initiative.

It will be followed by a concert organized jointly with the advocacy group Global Citizen, hosted by American actor, Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson.

FACING A BOYCOTT BY ADVERTISERS

Facebook ramps up efforts to curb 'hateful content' in ads

FACEBOOK said Friday it would ban a "wider category of hateful content" in ads as the embattled social media giant moved to respond to growing protests over its handling of inflammatory posts.

Chief executive Mark Zuckerberg said Facebook also would add tags to posts that are "newsworthy" but violate platform rules – following the lead of Twitter, which has used such labels

on tweets from President Donald Trump.

The initiative comes with the leading social network facing a growing boycott by advertisers – with soft drink behemoth Coca-Cola and Anglo-Dutch giant Unilever joining Friday – as activists seek tougher action on content they deem to promote discrimination, hatred or violence.

The new policy on

hateful content in ads will "prohibit claims that people from a specific race, ethnicity, national origin, religious affiliation, caste, sexual orientation, gender identity or immigration status are a threat to the physical safety, health or survival of others," Zuckerberg said.

"We're also expanding our policies to better protect immigrants, migrants, refugees and asylum seekers" from hateful ads, he continued.

Facebook has underscored its moves to stem racism in the wake of civil unrest triggered by the May 25 killing of African American George Floyd at the hands of Minneapolis police.

"We invest billions of dollars each year to keep our community safe and continuously work with outside experts to review and update our policies," a spokesperson said.

"The investments we have made in (artificial intelligence) mean that we

find nearly 90 per cent of hate speech" and take action before users report it.

'Newsworthy' exception

Zuckerberg said the "newsworthy" exemption normally occurs "a handful of times a year," when Facebook decides to leave up a message that would ordinarily be removed for rule violations.

Under the new policy, Zuckerberg said, "we will soon start labeling some of the content we leave up because it is deemed newsworthy, so people can know when this is the case."

He said users will be allowed to share the content "but we'll add a prompt to tell people that the content they're sharing may violate our policies."

Twitter in recent weeks has labeled at least one Trump tweet misleading and has flagged others as violating platform rules, accessible only when users click through a warning. The move has angered the

president and his allies.

Internet platforms have faced intense pressure from activists following Floyd's death.

A coalition including the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) has been urging companies to stop advertising on Facebook, using the #StopHateForProfit hashtag.

At the same time, Trump and his allies have voiced anger over what they claim is biased against conservatives.

Brand boycott accelerates

Zuckerberg made no mention of the ad boycott but said the changes were based on "feedback from the civil rights community and reflect months of work with our civil rights auditors."

Coca-Cola, a major force in global advertising, said it would suspend ads on social media for at least 30 days as it reassesses its policies, though it said the

decision was not related to the #StopHateForProfit campaign.

"There is no place for racism in the world and there is no place for racism on social media," James Quincey, chairman and CEO of The Coca-Cola Company, said in a brief statement.

He said social media companies need to provide "greater accountability and transparency."

Unilever, home to brands including Lipton tea and Ben and Jerry's ice cream, said it would stop advertising on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram in the US until the end of 2020 due to the "polarized election period."

American Honda said it would halt ads on Facebook in July, "choosing to stand with people united against hate and racism," adding to a list that includes US telecom giant Verizon and sporting goods makers Patagonia, North Face and REI.

SURVEILLANCE is the watchword at the seaside this summer, with Spanish beaches using drones, cameras and coloured tape to ensure safety for tourists holidaying in the shadow of the virus.

Although the pandemic is

now well under control, Spanish resorts are gearing up for a summer with a difference, with a host of precautions to keep beachgoers safe.

Over the curve of the bay in the northeastern resort of Lloret de Mar, a drone lazily flies overhead, the eye in the sky keeping

a close watch to ensure there's no overcrowding.

The aim, says mayor Jaume Dulset, is to "find the balance between people being comfortable and relaxing while ensuring a safe environment."

At this resort some 70 kilometres (45 miles) up the coast

from Barcelona, the town hall has drawn up plans to reassure tourists in the wake of the pandemic which in Spain has claimed more than 28,300 lives.

Always full in summer, its beaches are being partitioned off, with cameras and sensors transmitting real-time information to potential visitors via an app.

With more municipal staff to flag up any non-compliance, they are also using drones that can play recorded messages about social distancing should they spot overcrowding.

There's also a scheme for reserving areas on the sand — which would be easier to manage than a free-for-all — but for now, that won't be activated at this resort which is popular with British and French tourists for its family-friendly atmosphere and vibrant night-life.

Saving the summer

For now, only a handful of beachgoers are setting out towels and adjusting sunloungers on this kilometre-long (half-mile) beach which can accommodate up to 15,000 people.

"Normally we would be full

by this point but for now, there are very few people so it's easy to respect the security distance," explains 78-year-old Jose María Quicio.

He and his wife Olga, 81, have set up folding chairs a few metres from the shore inside a red cordon roping off space for those over 70.

"This is our area," say his wife after coming back from a dip in the sea.

"It makes you feel safer, it's good, better than before."

About 50 metres away, a lifeguard sits on his watchtower, wearing sunglasses and a fabric mask. As well as his normal duties, he must also watch for anyone flouting the distancing norms as well as disinfect the toilets and the first aid posts.

"Our first priority is ensuring no one drowns. But from now, we're also helping out with the rest," explains lifeguard coordinator Joel da Silva.

The town hall's plan involved training 8,500 workers in how to ensure health and safety in such places as well as in restaurants, hotels and nightclubs.

Fruit pickers sweat as virus flares in northern Spain

IN the verdant orchards of northeastern Spain, Guinean national Said Doumbia is picking nectarines in a job that earns him just 5.25 euros (nearly \$6) per hour.

After a long day in the sun, he's exhausted but when he finally clocks off, he must have his temperature taken before entering the sports hall where he's staying — the complex has been set up especially for seasonal workers following a flareup of the virus.

Thousands of immigrant workers come to this fertile valley in the Aragon region every year but a fresh outbreak of infections has worried the authorities.

To tackle the problem, the small town of Fraga on Thursday opened temporary accommodation for up to 50 workers who had been sleeping outside and to detect new cases of COVID-19.

When Doumbia arrives, a Red Cross worker scans his forehead with an infrared thermometer, then he must disinfect

his shoes and his hands.

After showering, he can have a hot meal then sleep in one of the halls' well-spaced beds, with lights out at 10:00 pm and breakfast served from 5:00 am.

"Some are working, others are looking for work," said Red Cross official Oscar Gracia.

"Some get very emotional, saying that at last they have a roof over their heads and a plate of hot food."

Many homeless fruit pickers travel around the country seeking work according to the season.

Mame Cisse, a lean 34-year-old in a grey t-shirt, arrived from Senegal two years ago and so far this season, he's earned earning six-euros-per-hour for picking onions in Albacete, and eight for picking olives in Huelva, both areas in the southeast.

Now he's in Fraga "looking for more work".

'Couldn't do it without them'

Spain has been badly hit by the virus, suffering more than

28,300 deaths, and the state of emergency had only just been lifted on June 21 when a new outbreak was detected at a fruit farm near Fraga which has been forced to close.

On Thursday, the health ministry said 250 cases had been identified in the area, almost all among seasonal workers, as the World Health Organisation warned of a resurgence in Europe since restrictions were eased.

After 14 weeks of lockdown but only one death, Fraga has had to reimpose some restrictions, banning gatherings of more than 15 people and visits to elderly care homes.

But mayor Carmen Costa said it was important "not to stigmatise the seasonal workers".

"We need them to come and work, we need them as much as they need us," she said.

"We can't have people sleeping in the street, especially not with the current health concerns."

There are around 1,000 ag-

ricultural holdings in the area, and 80 per cent of produce is earmarked for export with a market value of 60 million euros, says Ignacio Gramunt, director of mercoFraga which helps market the produce.

"In Fraga alone, we employ 5,000 seasonal workers who pick fruit and some 12,000 in the area. We couldn't do it without them."

On his farm, he employs 10 Bulgarians, all wearing masks and carefully spaced as they pick

nectarines destined for Germany.

Also staying at the sports hall is Faye, a 43-year-old Senegalese national who has been sleeping rough for a month.

All he wants is to be able to work legally, addressing his plea to Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez.

"Please, Pedro," he says. "Give us papers."

Relooking at our efforts to curb illicit drugs

MYANMAR and Thai authorities burned 25 tonnes of confiscated illegal drugs worth upwards of US\$ 2 billion on 26 June 2020 to mark International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking. The destruction of such a large amount of contraband seems like a great way to commemorate the occasion that falls every 26 June but it also serves as a grim reminder of the rising tide of drugs and organized criminals that keep finding new methods to smuggle illegal drugs.

Myanmar police seized a staggering 193 million methamphetamine tablets, 500kg of crystal meth and 290kg of heroin in a drug bust near northeastern Shan State on 19 May and the UWSA handed over 3.5 million meth pills and a drug courier they arrested to the south of the Wa self-administered zone on the 22nd.

As the illegal drug trade in Myanmar continues to run rampant and taint the youth of the nation, it's a relief that millions of methamphetamine tablets were seized in these two separate cases within the past week but also a concerning indication of the scale of illegal drug production that continues to operate in the nation.

While authorities are working hard uncovering and arresting drug traffickers, this may not be the only way of eradicating misuse of narcotics. What we need, first of all, is to provide a source of stable income and growth to the people residing in regions with the highest cases of illegal drugs.

In this day and age, it might be effective for the government to promote and fund local SMEs in those regions rather than directly creating jobs in industries limited to the civil service.

Second, educating the youths of today can go a long way in reducing and potentially eliminating drug abuse. Young people aware of the possibility of a bright future will be less likely to throw it away by misusing drugs.

Of course, that needs to be complemented with a strong education system and economy that will reward their hard work in the long run. Otherwise, they would see no reason to obey the law or keep away from harmful drug habits.

Which brings us to the third point; the need for better law enforcement. Even with all the proper laws, symbiotic economy and proper education a nation can provide, there may well be people who will produce narcotics for a pretty penny and consequently tempt members of the public into purchasing them for relief, and eventually dependence.

Granted, Myanmar is still in the early stages of a fledgling democracy, her legislators have made numerous amendments and additions to strengthen the legal backbone for enforcing anti-narcotic measures.

The police force and the Tatmadaw are doing their best to address the proliferation of illegal drugs across the nation, but there must still be a corrupt few in power that impedes the administration of the law.

Without the right people in the position to guide public participation in the fight against drugs, and without the security of a stable livelihood and achievable promise for a better future, the war on drugs in Myanmar could drag on for much longer than it already has.

Covid 19 Period "Cash for Work" Scheme in Rural Areas

RECENTLY there appeared an Article in the Global New Light of Myanmar regarding the Covid 19 Period "Cash for Work" scheme for people in the rural areas. It's a very timely venture by the Department of Rural Development to help the rural people to tide over the Corona Virus 19 Pandemic in Myanmar. The scheme would provide them with an opportunity to earn incomes when the rural wage employment prospect is rather bleak. At the same time the outcome will contribute in no small way to rural development. However, I would if

I may, like to make some suggestions regarding implementation of the scheme.

The first point is that the scheme will need considerable preparation as to what type of "Work" will address the income as well as the objective of Rural Development. For example the "Work" could be for village access road betterment or making available water for human consumption or improving sanitation or direct agricultural activities and so on. It would of course be better if the concerned rural people are consulted about the "Work" to be

performed.

The second point is the Supervision of the work so that it is well done and would contribute to development of the village/towns it is undertaken in. The Supervision should be the responsibility of the village/town administrative organ with technical advise preferably by the professionals at the Township level DoRD or hired Professionals on a daily or project period basis. They must submit on a regular basis, the status/progress of the "Work" being undertaken.

The third point is that the

"Workers" must conform to Directives of the Ministries concerned regarding "Child Labour" and "Forced Labour" prevention, both of which Myanmar is com-

The fifth point is the payments of the Cash to be made directly to the "Workers" and there should be transparency in the process.

The last point is to keep proper records of the "Workers" and "Work" performed for the sake of transparency and for reference purposes. Perhaps some future Researcher of the scheme would need the data.

Hotels and ashrams repurposed for Delhi coronavirus surge

STAFF at the luxury Suryaa hotel used to wear bright saris as they welcomed guests. Now they must don medical suits and handle gurneys as New Delhi desperately prepares for a predicted surge in coronavirus cases in the coming weeks.

The pandemic is still raging in India with more than half a million cases. The capital, home to 25 million people, is the country's worst-hit city -- its hospitals at breaking point and authorities reaching deep to confront the crisis.

"For doctors and nurses it is a part of their lives. For us this is a totally new experience and a very difficult one at that," said Ritu Yadav, operations manager at the five-star Suryaa, as staff in masks rush to deep clean the building.

"We have got training from the hospital on how to wear the PPE and then take it off but this is something I never thought I would have to do when I chose hospitality as my career."

Delhi, home to some of India's most crowded slums, has around 75,000 cases so far, but the city government predicts this will soar to half a million by the end of July.

With newspapers full of reports about patients being turned away from overflowing hospitals, Delhi told the city's hotels earlier this month they would be roped in to provide hospital care.

It is also converting wedding halls, and has several hundred repurposed railway coaches

standing by -- without air conditioning despite outside temperatures over 40 degrees Celsius (105 Fahrenheit).

The Delhi authorities have even started converting a spiritual centre or ashram into a coronavirus isolation facility and hospital with 10,000 beds, many made of cardboard.

'Hospitality, not hospital'

But for hotels, the move triggered outrage in an industry already reeling under losses because of travel restrictions.

The owners of Suryaa and four others approached the court, arguing many staff were over

50 and therefore were high-risk themselves, with no experience of hospital care or handling bio-medical waste.

"It came as a shock because we were not spoken to about it, we got to know through the press," Greesh Bindra, a top executive at the hotel, told AFP.

"It's like you are sleeping in a hotel and the next morning when you wake up you are told your hotel has become a hospital. Your first reaction will be how is this possible. We are hospitality, not a hospital."

The hotel won a reprieve from the court -- of sorts.

Instead of becoming a hos-

special guests.

"You have to keep your staff safe as after all they are your people," said Bindra, whose hotel will be offering 200 beds.

Cardboard beds

But whether the efforts of the Delhi government -- which is squabbling with the federal government of Prime Minister Narendra Modi -- will be enough is unclear.

Delhi has just over 13,000 beds for coronavirus patients in public and private hospitals. The city government forecasts it will need 80,000 beds by the end of July.

The government has cancelled leave of all healthcare staff and plans to rope in volunteers to fight the crisis.

It has refused to reimpose a lockdown, as the southern city of Chennai has done.

Many in Delhi are worried and are taking matters into their own hands.

Some resident welfare associations are buying oxygen cylinders and other equipment, while using vacant flats as isolation wards -- exposing the lack of trust in authorities.

"One of our residents lost his life just because he couldn't get a bed in time. Then we thought we should do something at our level," said Lokesh Munjal, the head of a west Delhi housing society.

"We don't want to be at the mercy of government and hospitals."

Taliban reject claims Russia aided fighters in attacks on US troops

KABUL — The Taliban on Saturday rejected a newspaper report claiming their fighters had received rewards from Moscow's spies to kill US troops in Afghanistan.

The New York Times reported Friday that bounties offered by a notorious arm of Russia's military intelligence service gave incentives to Taliban fighters to target US forces, just as US President Donald Trump tries to withdraw troops and end America's longest war.

"The nineteen-year jihad of the Islamic Emirate is not indebted to the beneficence of any intelligence organ or foreign country," the Taliban said in a statement issued in Kabul.

The group also denied previous US accusations it was given arms by Russia.

"The Islamic Emirate has made use of weapons, facilities and tools ... that were already present in Afghanistan or are war spoils frequently seized from the opposition in battles."

The Taliban said home-

made explosives accounted for most of the casualties among US forces.

The group reiterated it was committed to an accord signed with Washington in February that paves the way for with-

drawing all foreign forces from Afghanistan by mid next year.

Earlier on Saturday Russia also denounced the New York Times report.

The "baseless and anonymous accusations," published

by the newspaper, had "already led to direct threats to the life of employees of the Russian Embassies in Washington D.C. and London," the Russian Embassy in Washington wrote on Twitter. — AFP ■

Locust swarm enters Nepal: ministry

KATHMANDU — Nepali government said Saturday that the locust swarm has entered the country from its southern neighbor India.

Nepal's Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock Development confirmed the entry of the locusts in a statement after farmers of a few districts in Province 2, Province 5 and Bagmati Province reported an increment in the number of insects in their fields.

"Swarms of locust have reportedly entered Bara, Parsa, Sindhuli, Sarlahi and Rupandehi, among other districts," said Hari Bahadur KC, spokesperson at the agriculture ministry.

The insects are a collection of certain species of short-horned grasshoppers that migrate and swarm at the plants, destroying leaves and fruits, and leaving only stem. They are known for damaging large portion of crops in a very short period of time.— Xinhua ■

India passes 500,000 coronavirus cases

NEW DELHI — India now has more than 500,000 confirmed coronavirus cases, according to government figures released

Saturday that showed a record daily leap of 18,500 new infections.

Authorities said a total of 15,685 people had died after an-

other 385 fatalities were added to the toll in 24 hours.

The pandemic is not expected to peak in India for several more weeks and experts say the number of cases could pass one million before the end of July.

Some state governments are considering imposing new lockdowns. A hard-hitting nationwide lockdown that started March 25 is gradually being eased because of the damage caused to the economy.

The virus has particularly hit India's densely populated cities and there are now major concerns for New Delhi which has overtaken Mumbai with nearly 80,000 cases.

The city's government has

predicted it will have 500,000 infections by the end of July. It is already using railway carriages to house patients and has taken over hotels and banquet halls to relieve the pressure on hard-pressed hospitals.

The government has been criticised over a lack of testing that experts say has hidden the true number of cases in India, which now stands at 509,000.

The country is currently fourth in the world for the number of infections, behind the United States, Brazil and Russia, though it has a much lower death toll.

In a bid to boost tracing efforts, Delhi authorities have called in 33,000 health workers to screen about two million peo-

ple in sealed off zones across the city of 20 million people. But cities across the nation of 1.3 billion people are braced for a huge wave of new cases in coming weeks.

"It is likely that we're going into a state, unless we are able to reinforce a strict physical distancing mechanism or a hard lockdown, where the rate of infection will continue to increase," said Anant Bhan, a leading public health expert.

"Unlike China, where the pandemic was relatively more concentrated around Wuhan and a few other cities, India has a more diffused spread that makes it a bit more challenging for the healthcare system," he told AFP.— AFP ■

Shanghai launches self-driving ride service

SHANGHAI — Ride-hailing giant Didi Chuxing (DiDi) on Saturday launched the trial run of self-driving ride service on designated test roads in the eastern metropolis of Shanghai.

Users who have registered in

advance on DiDi's mobile app can hail an autonomous vehicle for a free ride, as long as their points of departure and arrival are within the 53.6-km designated roads in Shanghai's Jiading District.

DiDi said safety person-

nel have been deployed on the self-driving vehicles to respond to emergencies and take over the steering wheel if needed. In addition, DiDi has set up a safety center for monitoring the vehicle's operational status

and provide remote assistance when necessary. Zhang Bo, CTO of DiDi, said the company will start by assigning orders to both human and robotic drivers as autonomous vehicles can only work in certain areas.

"Autonomous driving needs to move beyond being a novel but limited experience and become a reliable and efficient daily mobility option for the general public in a highly complex world," Zhang said.— Xinhua ■

Fianna Fail's Micheal Martin elected as Ireland's PM

DUBLIN — Fianna Fail leader Micheal Martin was elected Saturday as Ireland's new prime minister, replacing Leo Varadkar as the country's Taoiseach during a special sitting of the Dail parliament.

Martin's election follows months of negotiations between his centre right party, Fine Gael and the Green Party, to reach an agreement following elections in February, before the onset of the coronavirus crisis.

"To be elected to serve as Taoiseach of a free republic is one of the greatest honours which anyone can receive," Martin told

the parliament.

The 59-year-old will be formally appointed by Ireland's president, Michael D Higgins, and is set to announce his ministers later in the day.

Martin takes over the role of Irish premier from Fine Gael's Varadkar in an historic reconciliation of Ireland's two major political parties which dates back to the foundation of the state a century ago.

Under the agreement, Fine Gael is set to regain the post of Taoiseach at the end of 2022.

The two parties needed the support of the Greens to have

a working majority in the Irish parliament, equating to around 80 seats.

Fianna Fail was Ireland's biggest party with 38 seats in the 160 seat chamber following February's election, Fine Gael received 35 seats and the Greens 12.

The political deal excludes republicans Sinn Fein from power.

The one-time fringe party won the popular vote with 24.5 percent of first preference ballots, becoming the second-largest force in parliament and is expected to become the main opposition party.—AFP ■

Ethiopia says on track to fill mega-dam as African Union pushes for deal

ADDIS ABABA — Ethiopia said Saturday it was on schedule to begin filling a controversial mega-dam on the Blue Nile River within weeks but vowed to try resolving its dispute with downstream neighbours Egypt and Sudan.

The statement from Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed's office undercut claims made Friday evening by Egypt and Sudan, whose leaders said Ethiopia had agreed to delay filling the dam's reservoir until an agreement was reached.

The Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD), set to be Africa's largest hydroelectric project, has been a source of tension in the Nile basin ever since Ethiopia broke ground on it nearly a decade ago.

Ethiopia says the project is essential for its development, while Egypt and Sudan worry about access to vital water supplies from the Nile.


Addis Ababa has been vocal about its plans to start filling the reservoir in July, and Abiy faces intense domestic political pressure to stick to that timeline.

The leaders of all three countries spoke Friday evening on a call convened by South African President Cyril Ramaphosa, the current chair of the African Union.

But while Sudan and Egypt said afterwards that Ethiopia had agreed to hold off on filling the reservoir as negotiations continued, Ethiopia's statement Saturday made no mention of a delay.

"Ethiopia is scheduled to begin filling the GERD within the next two weeks, during which the remaining construction work will continue," the statement said.

"It is in this period, that the three countries have agreed to reach a final agreement on a few pending matters."—AFP ■

France arrests six over Banksy artwork stolen from Bataclan

PARIS — Six people have been arrested in France over the theft of an artwork by street artist Banksy commemorating the victims of the 2015 Paris attacks that was stolen from the Bataclan concert hall, sources said Saturday.

The suspects were arrested across France this week after the artwork, an image of a girl in mourning painted on one of the Paris venue's emergency doors, was found in Italy earlier in the month, judicial and police sources told AFP.

Two were charged with theft while the other four were charged with concealing theft, the sources added. All six were placed in pre-trial detention.

The door with the artwork was cut out and taken in January last year at the Bataclan, where Islamic State gunmen massacred 90 people in 2015.

French and Italian police said on June 10 this year that

they found the work in an abandoned farmhouse in Italy's central east Abruzzo region.

One of the French policeman who intervened in the 2015 Bataclan attack was present when the door was found, and was overcome with emotion, according to the French crime unit.

Works by Banksy, known for their distinctive style, irreverent humour and thought-provoking themes, have been found on walls, buildings and bridges from the West Bank to post-Hurricane Katrina New Orleans.

At auction, they have sold for more than \$1 million.—AFP ■

Serbian defence minister tests positive for COVID-19

BELGRADE — Serbian Defence Minister Aleksandar Vulin has tested positive for COVID-19, the Defence Ministry said Saturday in a press statement.

Vulin underwent a regular test after having contact with one of the state secretaries in the Ministry of Defence, who was recently hospitalized due to COVID-19 infection, said the statement.

"The Minister of Defence is feeling well and since there are no symptoms of COVID-19 infec-

tion, he is in self-isolation," read the statement, adding that he will continue to perform the duties and adhere to all prescribed measures during self-isolation.

In the past several days, Serbia has been experiencing a surge of new coronavirus cases. As of Saturday, 13,792 cases of the novel coronavirus have been confirmed, with 267 deaths. In the past 24 hours, 227 new cases were confirmed, while two more people died. On June 23, Serbia's crisis response team ordered

mandatory use of face masks in public transportation, and recommended wearing them also in indoor spaces such as post offices, banks, public institutions, markets and shopping malls.

An emergency was declared in the central city of Kragujevac and the southern city of Novi Pazar due to spikes of new infection cases. Serbia had declared a state of emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic on March 15 and lifted it on May 6.—Xinhua ■

Coca-Cola says pausing social media advertising

SAN FRANCISCO — Coca-Cola, a major force in global advertising, announced Friday it would suspend ads on social media for at least 30 days, as platforms face a reckoning over how they deal with racist content.

“There is no place for racism in the world and there is no place for racism on social media,” James Quincey, chairman and CEO of The Coca-Cola Company, said in a brief statement.

He said social media companies -- which other major brands have boycotted to force

changes in how they deal with hateful material -- need to provide “greater accountability and transparency.”

Coca-Cola will use the pause to “reassess our advertising policies to determine whether revisions are needed,” Quincey said.

The beverage giant told CNBC that the “break” does not mean it is joining the movement launched last week by African American and civil society groups.

The coalition, which includes the National Association

for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), has been urging companies to stop advertising on Facebook, using the #StopHateForProfit hashtag.

It aims to achieve better regulation of groups inciting hatred, racism or violence on the platform.

Unilever, home to brands including Lipton tea and Ben and Jerry’s ice cream, said it would stop advertising on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram in the US until the end of 2020 due to the “polarized election period.”—AFP ■

L’Oreal to remove words like ‘whitening’ from products

PARIS — French cosmetics giant L’Oreal announced Saturday it was removing words like “whitening” from its products, against the backdrop of global anti-racism protests.

“The L’Oreal Group has decided to remove the words white/whitening, fair/fairness, light/lightening from all its skin evening products,” the company said in a statement.

The announcement follows Thursday’s decision by the Indian and Bangladeshi arms of Unilever to rename their locally marketed “Fair & Lovely” skin-lightening cream for the same reason.

Anglo-Dutch firm Unilever -- which reportedly raked in some \$500 million in revenue from the product in India last year -- said it would stop using the word “Fair”

in the name as the brand was “committed to celebrating all skin tones”.

Several companies -- including L’Oreal -- have been criticised recently for skin-lightening products after the global rise of the Black Lives Matter movement following the police killing in the US of African-American George Floyd last month.

Johnson & Johnson said last week it would stop selling some Neutrogena and Clean & Clear products, advertised as dark-spot reducers in Asia and the Middle East.

Several American groups have said they would to change their visual identity, such as Mars, which says it plans to develop its famous Uncle Ben’s brand, which uses a caricature of an African American as its logo.—AFP ■

Microsoft to permanently close all retail stores

SAN FRANCISCO — Microsoft said Friday it will close all of its stores and move its retail operations online, keeping just four locations and transforming them into “experience centres.”

The move means the more than 80 Microsoft stores closed due to the coronavirus pandemic will not reopen as the tech giant enters “a new approach to retail”, according to a statement.

“Microsoft will continue to invest in its digital storefronts on Microsoft.com, and stores in Xbox and Windows,” the statement said.

The four locations that will become Microsoft Experience Centers are in London, New York, Sydney and at the com-

pany’s Redmond, Washington headquarters.

Retail team members will “serve customers from Microsoft corporate facilities and remotely providing sales, training, and support,” the company said.

Microsoft said it will set aside \$450 million to cover the costs of closing the locations. The number of employees who would be affected was not immediately available.

“Our sales have grown online as our product portfolio has evolved to largely digital offerings, and our talented team has proven success serving customers beyond any physical location,” said Microsoft corporate vice president Da-

vid Porter. Microsoft in recent years has been relying more on its services such as cloud computing, with the retail locations focusing on its Surface tablets and laptops as well as Xbox gaming gear. But the physical stores failed to gain the momentum of rival Apple.

Independent technology analyst Neil Cybart said the closures were because “the Surface business increasingly looks to be losing momentum in the consumer space.”

The impact of the pandemic has not yet been reflected in Microsoft’s financial results. It posted a net profit of \$10.8 billion from January to March, up 22 percent year-on-year, on a turnover of \$35 billion.—AFP ■

Nationwide residential property prices in Philippines up by 12.4 pct in Q1, highest in 4 years

MANILA — Residential real estate prices of various types of housing units in the Philippines grew at a faster rate of 12.4 per cent year-on-year in the first quarter of 2020 based on the residential real estate price index, the Philippine central bank said on Friday.

The Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) said this is the third consecutive quarter that the index has registered a double-digit growth, which is higher than the 10.2 percent growth in the previous quarter and 3.3 per cent a year ago.

“This is also the highest growth rate since the first quar-

ter 2016,” the BSP said in a statement. By area, the BSP said residential property prices increase year-on-year in both the National Capital Region (NCR) and in areas outside NCR (AONCR).

The BSP said residential property prices grew at a faster pace in NCR at 18.3 per cent compared with those in AONCR at 8.5 percent. “The brisker growth of property prices in NCR can be attributed to the higher increase in the prices of condominium units, which outweighed the decline in prices of single detached or attached houses, duplexes and townhouses,” the BSP said.—Xinhua ■

Continued decline in all-India power demand affecting thermal PLFs: Ind-Ra

NEW DELHI — The all-India energy demand decreased 14.9 per cent year-on-year to 102.7 billion units in May while energy supply also decreased 14.9 per cent, resulting in the energy deficit remaining at 0.5 per cent (May 2019).

The power demand declined amid the Covid-19 led lockdown on account of a decline in commercial and industrial demand from major manufacturing states like Maharashtra (down 11.3 per cent), Gujarat (down 13.5 per cent) and Tamil Nadu (down 15.1 per cent).

The decline in power demand narrowed in May (down 14.9 per cent, April: down 22.3 per cent) due to the gradual lifting of lockdown for certain economic activities, increase in domestic consumption with the peak summer season and increase in agricultural usage due to the onset of sowing

season.

With the decrease in demand, electricity generation (excluding renewables) also decreased 17.7 per cent to 96.3 billion units in May (April: down 25.4 per cent) with thermal generation declining 21.4 per cent (April: down 28.5 per cent).

Thermal plant load factor (PLF) declined to 47.9 per cent (April: 42.4 per cent, May 2019: 63.6 per cent) on account of the lower demand, said Ind-Ra in its latest credit news digest on India's power sector.

Central, state and private sector PLFs decreased to 55.2 per cent in May (May 2019: 69.6 per cent), 40 per cent (61 per cent) and 49 per cent (61.3 per cent) respectively. Thermal PLFs were the most impacted due to the decline in the power demand over March to May, given the must-run status of nuclear, hydro and renewables.—ANI ■

S.Korea's consumer sentiment rises for 2 months

SEOUL — Sentiment among South Korean consumers over economic situation rose for two straight months thanks to fiscal stimulus packages, central bank data showed Friday.

The composite consumer sentiment index (CCSI) stood at 81.8 in June, up 4.2 points from the prior month, according to the Bank of Korea (BOK).

After bottoming at 70.8 in April, the index continued to gain for the second consecutive month as the government unveiled stimulus packages, including relief grants that were given to all households.

However, the index stayed far lower than 104.2 tallied in January, the month before the COVID-19 outbreak spread in the country. The reading below 100 indicates pessimists outnumbering optimists.

Sub-indices gained ground. The index for the current state of living advanced 5 points over the month to 84 in June, and the index for prospective state of living added 2 points to 87 this month.

The index for prospective household income and prospective consumer spending rose to 88 and 93 respectively this month.—Xinhua ■

China's external debt slightly up

BEIJING — China's outstanding foreign debt stood at 2.0946 trillion U.S. dollars by the end of March, data from the country's forex regulator showed.

The amount was 1.8 percent higher than that at the end of 2019, said Wang Chunying, spokeswoman and chief economist at the State Administration of Foreign Exchange (SAFE).

The country's external debt structure continues to improve amid stable expansion in recent years, according to Wang.

Facing the COV-

UK car production hits worst May since 1946 with 95.4 pct drop

LONDON — British car production plunged by 95.4 percent in May amid the coronavirus pandemic compared with the same month last year, marking the worst May since 1946, the Society of Motor Man-

ufacturers and Traders (SMMT) said Friday.

Data showed that only 5,314 vehicles rolled off production lines across Britain as car plants either closed or restarted at a reduced capacity due

to COVID-19, with 4,260 units being exported and just 1,054 for domestic buyers.

"While some two thirds of the UK's automotive plants started getting back to business during the month, capacity was severely held back by social distancing requirements and reduced demand, with key global markets only just beginning to reopen and the UK remaining in lockdown," said the SMMT.

Meanwhile, in the first five months this year, British cars manufactured reached 324,763 units, representing a decline of 41.7 per cent from the same period in 2019,

with "the full year outlook now expected to be fewer than one million units," the business organization said.

It warned that "potentially up to one in six jobs is at risk of redundancy" when the furlough scheme, a move launched by the government to support employees to keep jobs and receive a certain amount of wages, comes to an end in November.

Mike Hawes, chief executive of the SMMT, said: "May's figures are yet more evidence of why the UK industry, like its global rivals, needs dedicated support to drive a successful restart."—Xinhua ■

Three major bridges under construction in Ayeyawady Region

THE road transport network plays an important role in promoting economic and social development of a region, improving socioeconomic status of local people, and boosting the flow of trade. The proper development of road transport network not only reduces the cost of transportation both in terms of money and time but also helps in the integration of various regions and states in the country and better understanding of neighbouring countries at the international

level.

The Kyunpyathat Bridge near milepost 22/4 on the Bogale-Mawlamyinekyun-Kyone-mangae-Wakema-Myaungmya Road is being built by Special Bridge Group-2 of the Department of Bridge under the Ministry of Construction and the project as a whole is 85 per cent complete, according to a site in-charge tasked with overseeing the project. The bridge is 720 metres long, 7.5 metres wide and has a one-metre long pedestrian walkway on each side. The bridge is a steel box girder

with the floor of reinforced concrete and can withstand up to 60 tons of weight. The bridge's piles are mainly constructed from reinforcement cement concrete and its clearance is 40 ft. and waterway under the facility is 240 ft.

The Sawke Bridge near milepost 17 on the Bogale-Mawlamyinegyun-Wakema-Myaungmya road section under the Road Network Development Project in Ayeyawady Region is also under construction in Mawlamyinegyin Township. The bridge over the Sawke River is 750 metre in length, 7.5 metre in width and has the capacity to withstand 75 tones of loads. The bridge's clearance is about 40 ft. and the waterway under the bridge is 240 ft. Construction of the bridge has been about 85 per cent finished so far and it is scheduled to be opened to traffic soon. The projects are slated for completion in September and many skilled workers currently involves in the construction of the bridges, said U Aung Thiha, Director (Civil) of the Special Bridge Group-2.

Once completed, the bridg-

es would reduce travel time between Mawlamyinegyun and Patheingyi by two hours. Local people from Mawlamyinegyun and Bogale Townships would be able to travel to Labutta and the region's capital Patheingyi in a convenient manner and would be able to use the facilities in all seasons with greater ease. The new bridges would contribute to development of trade in the area, facilitate swift flow of commodities and reduce transportation charges for local people. Reliable road transport networks could support businesses of the locals and promote their socioeconomic status. Infrastructural development of a region plays a vital role in helping the country's GDP increase and uplifting the standard of living of poor people.

The Patheingyi Bridge-2, designed to link Patheingyi city and some residential wards on the west bank of Ngawun River is being built by Special Bridge Group-16 under the ministry at an estimated cost of Ks. 28.5 billion. The bridge construction project has been about 84 per cent finished so far. The

bridge is of a steel reinforced concrete facility and is 2,380-ft long with 28-ft wide traffic route. The bridge will be able to withstand up to 60 tones of weight and have a 5-ft wide pedestrian walkway on each side. The width of pillars and height for waterway will be 416-ft and 60-ft respectively. Construction of the bridge began on 27 October 2018 and the facility is slated for completion in July this year.


With rapid urbanization of Patheingyi City and urgent need for extension of urban residential housings on the west bank of Ngawun River, the Patheingyi Bridge-2 is built by the ministry. The bridge is expected to become an important landmark for Patheingyi, contribute to regional development and offer a faster route to beaches such as Ngwehsaung, Chaungtha and Shwe Thauk Yan, and to Ayeyawady Region and Rakhine State's coastal roads. Upon completion of the bridge, locals will be able to easily transport fishery products in the region to major cities in the country without any delays.

'Misconceptions and falsehoods': WADA formally responds to US report demanding reform

MONTREAL —The World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) formally responded to a US government report that recommended lawmakers be given power to withhold funding from the global drugs watchdog in the absence of governance reforms.

In a letter to James W. Carroll, director of the office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), WADA president Witold Banka reiterated the agency's "disappointment" at what WADA says are factual inaccuracies in the report as well as a lack of consultation as it was compiled.

"Given that, during our 12 June telephone meeting, we discussed a renewed spirit of cooperation, I would have expected your office to have consulted us on the Report; or, at the very least, to have verified the factual veracity of the allegations being made against WADA," Banka wrote.

"Instead, in the days before publication, you informed us of

the impending Report and asked us to verify three paragraphs by a certain deadline; and, when we did so in good faith, you chose not to incorporate our clarifications.

"As the saying goes, 'why let the truth get in the way of a good story?'"

Banka attached a summary of WADA's views on the report, reiterating the agency's view that it was littered with "multiple in-

accuracies, misconceptions and falsehoods."

The ONDCP study released this week questioned whether the United States was receiving value for money for its contribution of \$2.7 million per year to WADA.

It urges reforms to include independent athlete and anti-doping representatives on WADA committees and decision-making bodies.—AFP ■

Minamino determined to help Liverpool win another title

LONDON—Liverpool's Premier League title victory has yet to sink in for Takumi Minamino, but the Japan international said Friday he wants to play a bigger role in helping the club win more silverware.

Minamino transferred in January from Austrian champions Salzburg to Liverpool, who clinched their first domestic league title in 30 years after second-place Manchester City lost 2-1 at Chelsea on Thursday.

He has so far played in five league and three FA Cup games for the newly crowned English champions.

"I've only played for half a year with the club, so (the championship) hasn't really sunk in. But I want

to contribute to the team in the future and taste victory again," the 25-year-old attacker said in a comment released by the club.

While Minamino had limited playing time, he appeared in two matches after the league resumed on June 17 following a roughly three-month suspension due to the new coronavirus pandemic.

He said he was able to "gain confidence and noticed areas for improvement" in the two games -- a 4-0 win over Crystal Palace and a goalless draw at Everton.

With seven more matches remaining in the season, Minamino said,

"I want to achieve results in the games I play in and help my team win." —Kyodo ■

Anisimova rallies to beat Dolehide in Charleston

WASHINGTON—Amanda Anisimova saved a match point en route to a 5-7, 7-5, 10-2 victory over fellow American Caroline Dolehide at the invitational women's tennis tournament in Charleston, South Carolina.

Anisimova, 18, was staring at defeat when she trailed 5-7, 3-5 against her hard-hitting opponent, but the 2019 French Open semi-finalist blasted a forehand down the line to save match point and turned the tide, eventually triumphing in a 10-point tiebreaker.

She said the challenge of clawing her way back was just what she'd

missed with the WTA Tour shut down in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic. With the WTA slated to resume play in Palermo on August 3, this week's 16-player team event in Charleston — on the green clay courts that normally host a WTA event each year — is a chance for players to gain a little match experience in the disrupted year.

"That's why I miss being out here, just trying to face challenges and get yourself back together mentally as quick as possible," said Anisimova, who won 25 of the match's final 28 points.

Three top-20 players are taking part in the tournament, led by fourth-ranked Australian Open champion Sofia Kenin. Among other results on Friday, American Danielle Collins defeated former world number one Victoria Azarenka 6-1, 7-5.

Azarenka played just one WTA match in 2020 before the coronavirus shutdown and it showed as Collins raced through the opening set, winning seven straight games on the way to a 6-1, 2-0 lead. Collins, who reached the semi-finals of the 2019 Australian Open, wobbled slightly at the last.—AFP ■


Life often brings to people unexpected happenings. Unexpectedly, one day, an unfortunate fate fell upon our family.

I have heard this request for about ten times, and I replied, “Alright! Perhaps he can get it. I’ll teach him as much as I can”. I explain those parents patiently. In short, “Do you think if a Myanmar subject teacher is good, a student gets a distinction? He or she can get the distinction in Myanmar if he or she is a clever student. In fact, a teacher’s teaching involves 20 per cent, the student’s intellect is 80 per cent. The teacher can be proud of himself for about 20 per cent. The students whom I teach may win distinction in Myanmar subject, and then they pay homage to me for my teaching. Very often the parents say words of thank to me. I, then, reply that I have only 20 per cent to be proud of myself. 80 per cent goes to the students to be proud of themselves. In fact, teaching Myanmar subject, literature, is different from teaching Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, and Biology. A student can get the distinctions in these subjects if the teacher is really good. So, the teacher has 50 per cent of success to be proud of himself if the students get the distinctions in these subjects. Even in English, I think, 50 per cent of

success goes to the teacher for his teaching. So, if your child has 80 per cent of intellect, he or she will get the distinction because he gets a share of my 20 per cent completely.”

I have said these words so as to get parents to understand. Some parents listen to carefully, and I explain patiently. The readers may be cautious about it. The IQ of each child is not the same, but different apparently or imperceptibly. Especially, the language usage (if you make a note cautiously) is very clear. For a child, he has to keep on learning continuously since he was born. The baby learns who is father, mother, grandpa, grandma, their individual appearance and so on. He must get himself familiar with the voices of Daddy or Mommy. He has to make efforts to enunciate the sounds himself. Later, they have to learn different vocabularies, what is a cup, plate, box, tray, bowl, etc. Their learning goes endlessly.

For the next step, they have to learn verbs. Verbs are more difficult to learn than leaning nouns. They have to learn to use ‘eat’ for ‘rice’, ‘drink’ for ‘water’ correctly. The next step is more difficult. Learning ‘Happy’, ‘Sad’, ‘Like’, ‘Disgust’. They have to be learned not only for the sake of knowing the words but also to apply in utterances. They also learn how to put it more effectively. At this stage, I think, the

differences of QA between each and every child are apparent. For instance, after playing a game, the two children take a break. At that time, one kid says, “I’m tired!” and the other one says, “Oh! Tired to death!” Obviously, the second kid has more language instinct.

Later, they learn the vocabulary used by the seniors. I have a grandson attending KG. He often uses an example when he speaks. When he sees an ugly man, he speaks out, “His face is like an alien’s”. We all cannot help laughing out loud. When he sees a woman with ugly lips, he utters, “Her lips are like clipped”. Thank God! He speaks out only when the woman has left. If he uttered these words in her presence, it would be very embarrassing.

Children learn not only the subjects but also the speaking style of the people, uncon-

sciously. When they grow up, they read books, they learn not only the subjects in the books but also the language usage and spelling. When they come across a beautiful or effective expression or a striking example, they cherish it, and take it to their hearts. The outstanding scholars such as medico, historian, lawyer, and astrologer are well known for their intellect. However, not all these scholars write in different writing styles. The one who has greater intellect and practice can write better. Therefore, I am of the opinion that if the student gets a distinction in Myanmar subject, a teacher can get only 20 per cent of the success of a student to be proud of himself.



The Honest Boy

LAST week, I listened to the Dhamma talk on five moral precepts delivered by a prominent revered monk (Sayadaw).

He said like there are chiefs among the people, the five moral precepts also have a chief. The “chief” he meant is “an important one and without it other things are not useful. He asked the audience whether they know the chief of five precepts.

People gave different answers to the Sayadaw. Sayadaw said this is *Musāvādā verama ī sikkhāpada samādiyāmi* in Pali, and “I undertake the training-precept to abstain from false speech” in English.

Before Sayadaw gave reasons for why this one is chief. A doubt that abstaining from killing other beings should be chief came into my mind.

Sayadaw explained why lying is the chief of all wrong doings with examples.

He who tells lies has no wrong deeds that he can't do. After killing other beings, he can tell lies that I didn't. After taking what was not given, he can lie that he didn't. After committing sexual misconduct, he can lie that he didn't. After taking alcoholic drink or drugs, he can lie that he didn't. Therefore, there is no misdeed that he can't perform.

Honesty is just not lying? I previously believed that.

After reading the quote of American lawyer James E. Faust “Honesty is more than not lying. It is truth telling, truth speaking, truth speaking and truth loving”, I came to know that it is more than not lying.

For the quote, a story of a young boy who became a king was a good example.

Once upon a time, there was a king. Unluckily, he got no son who will succeed him. When he grew older, he declared that he himself will select a young boy who succeeds him.

He ordered all the young boys in his kingdom to gather at the palace's square, and said, “I will select one of you to reign the kingdom.”

“The essential qualifications for the king position are loving truth, being honesty, being brave, and being humble.” the king said.

He then gave a seed and a pot each to all young boys, saying that it is a test for the king post, and all the young boys have to grow plants by the seed at their home. The decision will be made by seeing the plants grown.

He gave one year duration of planting the seeds, and a date the young boy must come back with their pots and plants.

Among the young boys, Mg Htein, who is tak-

Conservationists put 20 Loggerhead turtles back in sea in Kawthoung to save rare species

THE Myeik Archipelago (MA) comprises about 800 islands of primarily limestone and granite located along 60 km off Myanmar's southern coast, supporting breeding grounds for turtle species which are facing extinction in the world.

These islands are covered by lowland wet evergreen forest and surrounded by an extensive coral reef system. Mangrove forests, beach and dune forests, and seagrass beds add to the faunal and floral diversity.

Of the seven turtle species around the world, five of them – Green turtle, Hawksbill turtle, Olive Ridley turtle, Leatherback turtle and Loggerhead turtle – inhabit in Myanmar seas.

Recently, conservationists from the Fisheries Department in Kawthoung, Taninthayi Region, put 20 baby loggerheads in the sea after nurturing them on the Nyaung U Phee Island, which is popular for its white sandy beach.

The baby loggerheads were brought from Haigyikyun in Ayeyawady Region in March and they were nurtured in man-made special nest for them on the beach of the island which is about 30 miles nautical miles from Kawthoung.

The loggerhead is considered endangered species in Myeik Archipelago.

In July 2019, turtle conservationists spotted a Loggerhead turtle for the first time in the turtle conservation zone in Rakhine coast.

The Loggerhead turtle came to the scene after the species disappeared in the area for a long time. They loggerhead turtles are becoming rare in the Southeast Asia.

All the five rare sea turtle species could be recorded in southern Rakhine State.

The number of turtles are declining in Myanmar due to use of fishing nets and indiscriminate consumption.



Bringing back Ngahpein in Inle Lake from extinction

IN efforts to conserve Inle carp or locally called Nga Hpein (Cyprinus intha), a Cyprinid fish commonly found in Inle Lake and an endemic species in Myanmar, a government-hatchery in Nyaungshwe produces over 700,000 fingerlings of the species yearly.

Inle Lake is located on the Shan plateau in the Southern Shan State of Myanmar. It is the largest Lake in Shan State.

After finding out that the fish species population abundance has decreased and is facing extinction due to changes in water quality

and decreased clarity, the IUCN Red List declared the Inle carp as endangered in 2011 as it had been impacted by the introduction of some Cyprinus species in the Lake.

The fingerlings produced by the Nyaungshwe Hatchery are distributed to local fish farmers and also released into the lake in efforts to bring the species back from extinction.

In 2018-2019 fiscal year, about 720,000 fingerlings were released

into the lake, according to the Deputy Director of the Shan State Fisheries Department U Kyaw Thiha Htwe.

C. intha inhabits the shallow zone of the Lake, especially in areas with dense submerged vegetation and muddy with high organic bottom. Spawning of this species usually takes place in waters with temperature ranging from 24°C to 26°C, between November and March.

There is an urgent need to uplift the status of the fishermen and also to safeguard the sustainability of array of indigenous, endemic and ornamental fish species that enjoy the eco-friendly nature of Inle water.

Moreover, there is a need to maintain the Inle Lake to be environmentally friendly for the aquatic fauna and flora to thrive.





KA-BYAR-LUT (ကဗျာလွတ်အက), a graceful and enchanting Myanmar Traditional dance

MYANMAR has its own traditional dances. A variety of traditional dances which captivates the viewers or audiences due to beautiful and synchronous movements of the dancer's head, waist, legs (feet) and hands in line with Myanmar tunes or Myanmar scale. Myanmar styles of dances, Myanmar music, traditional musical instruments and display or setting of dazzling Myanmar orchestra on stage with performing arts captivate the locals and foreigners alike. The Myanmar orchestra is dazzlingly beautiful as its decoration or ornamentation is made of glass mosaic embedded in gilding. Basic Myanmar traditional musical instruments consist of bronze instrument, string instrument, leather (skin) covered instrument (long and short drums), wind instrument and bamboo-clapper.

The successive governments of Myanmar sent Myanmar cultural troupes to foreign countries, especially Europe countries, on cultural exchange program. Most of the foreign audiences appreciate the graceful and enchanting Myanmar traditional dances and tunes. They also enjoy Myanmar music played by the set of Myanmar drum-circle (ပတ်ဝိုင်း သို့မဟုတ် ဆိုင်းဝိုင်း) and the set of small brass gong of the traditional Myanmar brass gong circle (ကြေးနောင်ဝိုင်း).

In addition, the audiences are mesmerized by the performance of traditional dancers and the traditional beautiful dance costumes. Myanmar cultural troupes are always given laudatory award and appreciation by the audiences in foreign countries whenever the troupes entertain to them. Next to Myanmar plays, dances, Myanmar traditional string-marionette show manipulated by living humans on stage is fascinated by the foreign audiences as well.

The theatre-goers and enthusiasts of Myanmar traditional dances are obsessed with the Ka-Byar-Lut dance item consisting 125 (one hundred twenty five) different steps. Basically, all sorts of traditional dance patterns are used with heads, waist, legs and hands, fingers on the flexible motions. So are the Ka-Byar-Lut dance patterns. A Ka-Byar-Lut dancer must be skilful enough to use the flexible motions of her or his body parts mainly heads, waist, legs, hands and proper facial expressions must be shown. Since Ka-Byar-Lut (ကဗျာလွတ်အက) is one of the popular Myanmar traditional dances in Myanmar, Myanmar youngsters especially school students and adults like to learn how to dance it.

Daw Oba Thaung was an eminent Myanmar 'Anyeint' dancer and singer (အပြိုင်မင်းသမီး) in Mandalay. Myanmar term 'Anyeint' means; 'non-dramatic

performance where a female artiste dances and sings to the accompaniment of light music and is usually supported by comedians'. Daw Oba Thaung codified 125 steps

of the traditional Myanmar choreography called Kabyar-lutt dance (ကဗျာလွတ်အက) in 1953. The state School of Music (ဝန်ကျာကျောင်း) was opened in Mandalay in 1953 and Daw Oba Thaung was appointed as a dance teacher. She was the first instructor of dances in that school. She disseminated and shared the innovative dance techniques and patterns of Ka-Byar-Lut (ကဗျာလွတ်အက) to the students of State Music School in Mandalay. In other words, she is the pioneer or innovator of Kabyar_lutt dance patterns. She coined the word "Kabyar_lut" for this type of dance. The literal meaning of "Ka-Byar-Lut' (ကဗျာလွတ်) is "A Dance with No poetry". This implies that it is a type of dance comprising no recitation of poem, no chanting of verse and literature. This style of dance can be performed by a single dancer or a group of dancers rhythmically and harmoniously.

Daw Oba Thaung innovated "Ka-Byar-Lut' dance (ကဗျာလွတ်အက) and taught dance patterns and dance-techniques to the professional dancers as well as the Music School students in Mandalay. The students have to exercise to devel-

op the flexibility of their bodies so that the specific physical motions can be performed in accordance with the designed or pattern of the dance accompanied with the proper drum-beat or tune or melody. At first, Daw Oba Thaung had innovated basic 25 steps of Kabyar_lutt dance played by four short-drums with clappers in metal (စည်းနှံင့်ဝါး) and bamboo.

Gradually, she increased the number of Kabyar_lutt dance steps. She had designed up to 125 Kabyar_lutt dance steps. These 125 steps comprise all of the Myanmar dances. Compulsorily, all the would-be professional dancers have to learn Kabyar_lutt dance. She taught the female students and the artiste by the name of U Shwe Daung Nyo taught male students. Daw Oba Thaung enlisted U Shwe Daung Nyo's help to compose a rhyme for the Kabyar_lutt dance of the basic 25 steps. Furthermore, she incorporated all six kinds of Myanmar string-marionette "thrust chin" (ရှပ်သေးရှပ်မေးထိုး) movement into the new designed Kabyar_lutt dance. Thus, the performing of Kabyar_lut dance become more appealing to the viewers or audiences. She was acclaimed as a choreographer or an innovator for all steps of Kabyar_lutt dance. Her choreography has added the mesmerizing Kabyar Lut (ကဗျာလွတ်အက) to Myanmar traditional dances. So Daw Oba Thaung is known as the mother of Ka-Byar-Lut (ကဗျာလွတ်အက) in the history of Myanmar performing arts.

The dancer's facial expression has to be cheerful and lively in performing Ka Byar-Lut dance. In other words, Ka-Byar-Lut, (ကဗျာလွတ်) means the rendition of music and instrumental accompaniment played by four-traditional-short-drums (ဝုံလေးလုံး) with timing bells and bamboo clappers (စည်းနှံင့်ဝါး). Since it has no poetry nor song the Ka-Byar-Lut (ကဗျာလွတ်)

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on the respective steps and movement played by the four short- drums with timing bells and bamboo clappers.

In the course of KaByar-Lut dance, the positions of hand and fingers or hand attitudes known as-mudras (မုဒြာ) and head, waist, legs (feet) and limbs must be moved in harmony properly. Each step is moved in steady, synchronous and graceful way in line with drum-beats. The dancer has to see the moving hands while dancing and perform a sequence of graceful steps and movements. The dancer does not recite poems, verse and literature lampoon. The dancer or performer can wear Myanmar casual dress for the ordinary occasion or ceremony when she or he entertains to the audiences. If it is a group for dancing KaByar-Lut dance to entertain public, they have to wear same Myanmar casual dresses. However, if it is for state guest entertainment or concert or cultural show or formal occasion, the dancers have to wear full dress.

In Myanmar, the various traditional occasions or ceremonies or events such as schools concerts, opening ceremony of sporting events, opening or closing ceremony of traditional festivals, state banquet for foreign guests are entertained with KaByar-Lut dance. Some of the dancers are amateurs and some professionals indeed. The dancer must be skilful enough to perform KaByar-Lut in respective steps or movements. In some government-owned schools, colleges and universities the basic course of KaByar-Lut dance is being taught as

an extra-curriculum subject (not a compulsory subject) to the students who like to learn how to dance it.

The popular Ka Byar-Lut dance item is admired by ordinary audiences, enthusiasts, traditional dance amateurs and foreigners as well. The government also promotes and transmits the Myanmar traditional

dances to the enthusiastic people. Basic KaByar-Lut dance training course is being given to basic and higher education across the country.

The KaByar-Lut basic course training program intends to disseminate basic course of KaByar-Lut dance to all levels of students for learning how to dance it systematically. The training course is conducted by

the Fine Arts Department under the Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture. This popular traditional dance is cherished by Myanmar people. We express thankful to those who preserve our own traditional dances including KaByar-Lut dance as professionals or as instructors at the National University of Arts and Culture, Yangon and National University of

Arts and Culture, Mandalay.
